Milton, townships discuss water for Heights, Peru area

"Do you want to supply the people of Milton Heights with water", Esquesing Reeve George Currie asked Milton Council Wednesday when he appeared with Deputy-Reeve Tom Hill and Nassagaweya Reeve W. Coulter and Deputy-Reeve W. Hoey.

Erin Township School Area A new wrinkle in the reported an increase in township's three schools this registration at the three schools year-kindergarten classes-attracted approximately 90 new students. Kindergarten classes operate all day at Brisbane and half days at

Ospringe and Hillsburg. Total registration at the three schools is Ospringe 240, Hillsburg 265 and Brisbane 288. J. Bruce Macpherson heads the

construction costs and most suitable route from the town's Kelso water line.

The meeting was to discuss the possibility of providing municipal water for the Milton Heights-Peru area where wells have become polluted. The area is largely in Esquesing Township with a smaller portion in

Nassagaweya. Reeve Coulter told the meeting there were 106 households in the area with an extimated 400 people, and a preliminary estimate of water consumption was 28,000 gallons daily. He reviewed one proposed route for the water line from the town main at Highway 401 south along the Milton Heights or Town Line road through the Heights. Another extension would be made from Milton's west boundary to serve the Peru

Mayor Best noted the town's line on the Base Line Rd. now extends to Martin St. only, with an extension necessary along the Base Line to the Western boundary if it is to serve Peru from that direction.

Councillor P. Barr pointed up the difficulty of such a route which would produce two dead-ends in the system while a looped system was preferable. The problem of servicing the Base Line road to Peru was also compounded by the fact houses on the south side of the road were in Oakville and those on

the north in Esquesing. Deputy Reeve Hill of Esquesing suggested if the Oakville people were interested in the service they would have to come to Esquesing. The township wasn't planning any joint meeting with Oakville

Mayor Best distributed a copy of a 1960 agreement Milton had made with Trafalgar on supplying sewer and water service to that area on Nippissing Road, which was then in the township and later Oakville. He suggested it set a precedent for the town and might serve as a guideline for current discussions with Nassagaweya and

Esquesing. When the Mayor suggested an additional clause had been recommended for any future agreements restraining the municipalities receiving service from opposing any annexation applications, Reeve George Currie declared it would never by agreed to. "We'd be out automatically if that has to go

in", he declared. Deputy Reeve Hoey suggested one council could not commit future councils to such a

condition, while Reeve Coulter acknowledged there might be some understanding that development in the area of the water line would have to be

controlled. During discussion of water rates that would be charged by the town it was concluded the average two month bill to an outside residential user might be a maximum of \$15. This was based on the use of 280 gallons daily over the two month

Mayor Best suggested the township delegation might consider how it could include the Oakville houses on the south side of the Base Line road that would want service.

Deputy Reeve Hoey suggested Milton should take the leadership in some of these problems. He expressed his confidence that Milton will be the centre of government in this area for a good many years to

The meeting adjourned with members of the township delegation assuring Milton Council they would prepare with their engineer detailed projections of anticipated usage, routes of the line and other detail for submission to a later meeting at the call of the townships.
