Last week at Maple Rock Shooting Range this scribe set the pace with 25 straight, my first, and also 24. Brad Mainprize came up with a pair of 24's, John Cordes 23 and 24, Art Bessner 21, and Ed Hawes 20 Mr. Berry, our senior member, came up with 21.

During the season, John Shadbolt led the members with a total of 487 out of 500 for an average of 24.3 out of 25. John wins the trophy for the top individual shooter in the club. Brad Mainprize was second with a total of 471 out of 500 for an average of 23.50 out of 25. John Cordes was next with 467 for an average of 23.35 out of 25.

Other members' averages were as follows: Gord Clow 462, 23.10; Art Hawes 439, 21.95; Ed Hawes 432, 21.6; Bill Miller 397, 19.85; and Earl Jollymore 317, 15.85.

Number one squad won the team trophy. Members on the winning squad were Art Hawes (captain) Gord Clow and Bill Miller. The squad got a total of 1298 out of 1500 for an average of 432.83 out of 500 per shooter.

Number two squad placed second. Members were John Cordes (captain), Brad Mainprize and Earl Jollymore. The second squad got 1255 out of 1500 for an average of 416.33 out of 500 per shooter.

In third place with a total of 1051 out of 1500 for an average of 350.33 per member came the third squad consisting of Ed Hawes (captain), John Shadbolt and Keith Mainprize.

Halton Sportsmen's Association from Milton visited at Maple Rock this week for the second half of the annual competition.

Last spring, Maple Rock took a 31 bird lead over Halton Sportsmen. This week the local shooters added 14 more to their lead to end up with 465 out of 500. Halton Sportsmen had a total of 411.

Shooters from Maple Rock were Gord Clow 24 and 25 for 49 out of 50, John Cordes 24 and 24 for 48, Brad Mainprize 25 and 21 for 46, Tom Döring 21 and 21 for 42 and Art Hawes 18 and 23 for 41.

Halton Sportsmen's representatives were Dave Tuck 22 and 22 for 44, Ron Marshall 21 and 22 for 43, Don Kearney and John Readhead both with a pair of 21's for 42 and Gord Tuck 23 and 18 for 41.

This the second consecutive year that Maple Rock has won the trophy. Other scores at Maple Rock this week were Bill Miller who got 20 and 18, Earl Jollymore 19 and 19 and Jack Both 17 and 19.

Maple Rock came up with a very respectable average of 91.2 per cent per shooter in the trophy shoot against Halton Sportsmen.

Giant benefit scramble expects over 100 bikes

Sunday September 22, Lloyd's Ranch on Hwy. 7 just west of Guelpi, will be the scene of a giant benefit motorcycle scramble.

Over 100 riders including Gerry Van der Eyken of Acton are expected to compete in the races sponsored by the Nortown Motorcycle Club of Toronto.

Profits are to be donated to a benefit fund for Klaus Grundler, a young family man from Darien Centre New York who was crippled in an accident during the supporting motorcycle races at Mosport last June.

In a scramble, the bikes race a set number of laps over a closed course of natural terrain, and at Lloyd's Ranch it is a fast-paced track over rolling hills.

Each classification of bike and rider race in three sets with points awarded by order of finish in each set. The overall

winner is determined by the most number of points. The Grand Finale race is an "all-comers" race with the winner the first to finish.

Riders are coming from all across Ontario and some from the United States. Among them will be Regional and National Champions including ex-Czechoslovakian Champion Frank Mrazek.

Since the purpose of the race is to raise money for Klaus Grundler, costs are being kept low. There will be no trophies and the Canadian Motorcycle Association has waived sanction fees. Riders will be competing for love of the sport.

Practice gets underway at 10 a.m. with races starting at 1 p.m. Admission is \$1.50 per adult, children under 12 free.

The event is on this Sunday-rain or shine.
