Response doesn't warrant bus - yet

Tyler Transport, willing to take a busload of Acton students to school in Georgetown and Brampton, advertised last week with disappointing results. Certainly not enough students responded to fill a bus for the trip each day.

Of the 45 Acton students who take vocational courses in Georgetown, only nine said they would like to have bus service.

Of the 13 or so who attend Sheridan College in Brampton, just two answered the ad in last week's Free Press.

Ted Tyler Jr. said this week he is still perfectly willing to provide the bus service, if enough students contact him. He estimated the cost to Georgetown would be about 80 cents a day, and to Brampton maybe \$1.50 a day. The number of students going would determine the cost, he said.

Acton high school board was approached at their last meeting by a parent who asked why no transportation was provided for the students who are taking at Georgetown courses that are not available in Acton. While the school board will pay their tuition, it makes no provision for arranging for or paying for transportation. This is not required under law, board members told the parent.

He was referred to Tyler Transport, who advertised two days later. The same paper contained three classified ads placed by students seeking rides to Georgetown.

Some of the students have by now arranged to use the family car or joined car pools.
