#### 28,300 cattle across Halton

Some interesting facts and figures on Halton agriculture came to light in a recent crop and livestock report issued by the Ontario Department of

Agriculture and Food. Halton had 28,300 cattle at June 1, an increase of 800 over the same date a year ago. These included 200 bulls, 10,000 milk cows, 3,400 beef cows, 2,700 yearling heifers for milk purposes, 1,900 yearlings for beel purposes, 6,100 calves. 4,000 steers.

Estimated yields per acre for field crops in the August report showed 38.7 bushels per acre of winter wheat, 57.3 oats, 50.9. barley, 55.5 mixed grains and 2.17 tons per acre in hay cropt.

Pasture conditions on August 15 were reported as above average by 54 farms, average by 38, and below average by eight.
