Divorces increasing

A rash of divorce cases 28 on the docket extended the work of Mr. Justice W. D. Parker at the Supreme Court sittings in Milton.

New divorce laws have increased the number of valid reasons for granting divorces, including separation for more than three years, homosexuality, physical and mental cruelty, drug addiction, criminal tendencies and desertion.

The court also heard eight suits arising from motor vehicle accidents and two stemming from negligence in the operation of a motor boat.

A non-capital murder charge, one of criminal negligence and another of criminal negligence and failing to remain at the scene of an accident were also on the list for the September sittings.
