

Let's Play Bridge

Here is a hand that gave a few declarers a bit of trouble last week at the Acton Bridge Club. Only one North-South pair got a plus score when they set four

clubs doubled two tricks. The dealer is South and East-West are vulnerable.

> NORTH D-7642 C-Q 1074

EAST S-J 6 2 S-10 3 H-Q198653 H-Vold D-J 108

> ·H-A 1074 D-A Q 5 2

The bidding: South 2S, West Pass, North 2 N.T., East 3 C; S-3 H, W-Pass, N-3 S, E-Pass; S-4 S, W-All Pass.

Opening lead - 6 of clubs.

Although South opened 2 spade when this hand was played, I do not approve of this bid. South is looking at six potential losers and that is a few too many for a demand bid. The action by East varied at each table. Some bid three clubs, some four and one even went five clubs. I guess eight card suits do something to some bridge Having arrived at four spades,

no declarer found a way to make the contract. This is most surprising since declarer has only two hearts and two diamonds to worry about.

The best play on this hand would be to ruff the opening club lead and take two rounds of

When the opponents trump split three-two, declarer should leave, the third one outstanding. A heart to the king exposes East's void but East is out of trump. Declarer plays a heart to his ace and ruffs a heart. Now the diamond is led and declared should play either low or the

With the wild distribution showing up, declarer must find the diamond king either singleton or doubleton. It is safer to play the ace, remove West's last trump and exit with a diamond.

If the finesse is attempted, West will win the lead two rounds of hearts. When declarer trumps he cannot draw West's last trump. If he does he is out of trump and will lose his contract when East gets in with a diamond.

The moral, if any, is don't open these hands with a demand bid unless you can make a game opposite a few points that dummy may provide.

Six ball teams were aponsored this year which gave many folks great enjoyment in the evenings and Sunday afternoons. Many thanks go to the people who helped make all this possible.



O.P.P. report

despite fair crowds

The Acton Fall Fair, bringing record breaking crowds, parades, and a heavy volume of traffic to our town, kept the Acton Detachment Personnel reasonably busy during the past week. However, we are happy to report no serious incidents.

General occurrences for the week totalled 19, and included two thefts, two minor disturbances, 10 liquor infractions with the remainder being of a less serious nature.

On the traffic scene, two property damage accidents were investigated with a total financial loss amounting to approximately \$1000.

During the 545 miles logged on the Acton Detachment cruiser, 17 persons were issued summons for faulty driving while 14 others were warned for minor traffic offenses.

Prov. Const. Roy Wood conducted a safety lecture to grade 3 students at the Robert Little School, stressing the danger of accepting auto rides from a stranger.

Officers at this detachment would like to point out to the motoring public the inconsiderate parking observed on many of our streets. It is not unusual to see cars parked facing in the wrong direction, several feet from the curb or both. Illegal parking in the Acton Post Office area is of special concern during rush hour periods. It takes but an extra second to cross the street, to walk 50 feet, or make sure your vehicle is

parked close enough to the curb. Take that extra second, please. Avoid a parking tag that may be issued, or better still, a serious accident which could occur.

Proposes subdivision 40 homes at village A plan of subdivision in the

village of Campbellville opposite the ball park could increase the population of the village by about 30 per cent if it meets approval through proper channels.

George Goldstraw, a realtor, has submitted plans of subdivision to Nassagaweya Township Planning Board. The plans called for construction of approximately 40 homes in two phases, 16 in the first phase and 14 in the second phase and it met with the planners approval.

The homes would be valued at \$30,000 each and constructed on' two, streets, Mt. Goldstraw proposed. The names of the streets were suggested as being William Avenue and Glen Murray Drive.

The plan has yet to be presented to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and the Township Council, Reeve William Coulter spoke in favor of the subdivision. "It is in keeping with Council's views on planning and could be considered a pilot project," he said. Mr. Coulter said the project was not large enough to cause serious servicing problems and could be helpful in experiencing local officials and preparing them for a larger proposition of a similar nature in the future. .Mr. Coulter said there would

have to be a suitable agreement between council and the developer, concerning, water, sewage and road facilities . .

There are four plans of subdivision being prepared.
