Escapees are blamed 12 prowler complaints

Merchants busy missed the fair

Sidewalk Sales, even when operated two weeks in succession, proved very successful, the participating merchants found.

Although some had intended to close up and go to the fair Saturday afternoon, they had customers all day long and never the door.

The event was a repeat of last year's "Old Fashioned Days"-without the costumes, but with the same bargains.

During the week of September 15 to 21, officers of Milton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, investigated 66 general occurrences including two thefts and two attempted thefts; two assaults, one of which proved to be unfounded; three liquor investigations resulting in two persons being charged; 12 prowler complaints, most of which were the direct result of the escape of four prisoners from the Halton County Jail; did get time to turn the key in -two cars reported stolen, one recovered and the other turned out to be unfounded; two cars were recovered in our area for other forces; three escapees from

the Halton County Jail were

apprehended, the fourth remains outstanding at the present time; one premise was found insecure

at night; and one impaired driver

was apprehended. A total of 20 accidents were investigated' including six personal injury accidents resulting in eight persons being injured, and 14 property damage accidents. Total property damage was \$7,160. There were 14 charges laid as a result of these accidents.

Causes of accidents were, careless driving, speed, did not have right of way, fail to stop for stop signs, stone falling from another vehicle, and an unlighted farm tractor.
