



Many people in Halton, particularly parents, were shocked in recent days because of the news that many young people in Oakville were rushed to hospital after taking LSD, and possibly other drugs. My immediate concern, of course, was for the young people themselves some of whom may suffer permanent damage as a result of taking these drugs.

LSD, speed, and other drugs, have become much too prevalent and fashionable among young people. There is a need for an intensive educational programme. They must be made aware that taking drugs is not a lark like smoking was among young people 20 years ago.

It is imperative that young people realize that taking drugs is just as dangerous as putting a loaded revolver to their head and pulling the trigger. The Federal Government, Provincial Governments, Boards of Education, Churches, school teachers, municipal councils, police departments, and responsible young people must not rest until this drug problem is solved.

As soon as I heard about the Oakville incident I made several enquiries and I found that the Canadian Film Institute has a film on the effects of LSD. I then got in touch with Inspector Harry Wilson of the Oakville Police Department and arrangements were made to have a copy of the film sent to the Oakville Police Department. The police, in co-operation with the Oakville Board of Education, will show this film to as many young people as possible.

I also brought this subject up in the House of Commons and asked the Minister of National Health and Welfare how much research the Federal Government is doing on the effects of LSD and other drugs and what information has been compiled for distribution to schools.

An Inspector of the Railway Transportation Committee will be at the Council Chambers in Acton on October 17 to obtain the views of residents on the proposed closing of the CNR Station. I have been in contact with interested parties in Acton and I strongly urge each and everyone of you to present your

views to the Inspector when he comes to Acton on the 17th. Several people have expressed surprise to me that my election campaign cost only \$11,700. The reason, of course, is that most of our campaigning was done on a personal meet-the-people approach through knocking on doors and attending public meetings. Most of our campaign money was spent on printing posters and leaflets.

I am pleased to report that I have been elected Treasurer of the Ontario Liberal Caucus. This position makes me a member of the Executive and I hope to contribute substantially to the success of our Ontario operations and I look upon the position as another opportunity to serve the people of Halton.

The Halton Housing Brief was accepted and praised by the Honourable Paul Hellyer and while the Housing Committee was not asked to appear before the Task Force at its recent Toronto hearing, it is very likely that the Chairman will discuss the Brief's proposals with Mr. Hellyer later this year in Ottawa. In the meantime Mr. Butler has accepted speaking engagements in the Riding to discuss the housing situation with interested groups. If you would like to discuss the housing situation with him he may be reached at 845-1256 in Oakville.

Terrance Kennedy, President of the Halton Liberal Association, held a Riding policy meeting last week and more than 40 people attended. It is my hope that the Policy Committee

### Long distance delayed

Long distance telephone calling in and out of Ontario centres may be delayed over the next several weeks.

A Bell Canada spokesman said the company must reduce the load-carrying ability of the long distance switching equipment while the final phase of a three and a half million dollar program to increase the call carrying capacity of the Toronto toll-switching system is completed.

The program will be carried out in two major stages starting over two weekends this month when the traffic load is reduced. First stage was carried out over the past weekend. Second stage, which will affect long distance calling patterns between a number of Ontario centres and some U.S. points will take place on the weekend of October 18.
