### Former Acton Pipe Band member, Mr. Duby led the throngs to the strains of the bagpipes.

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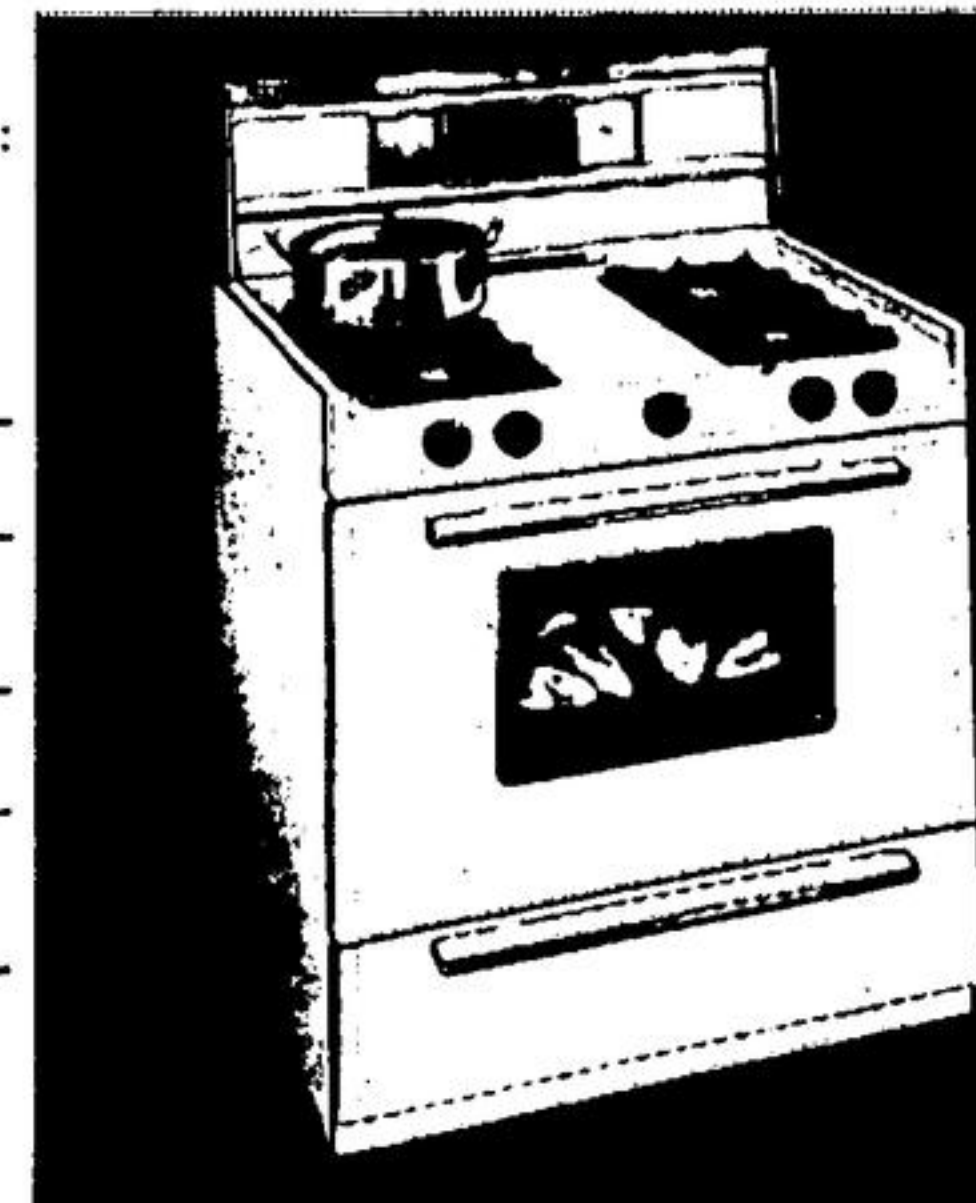

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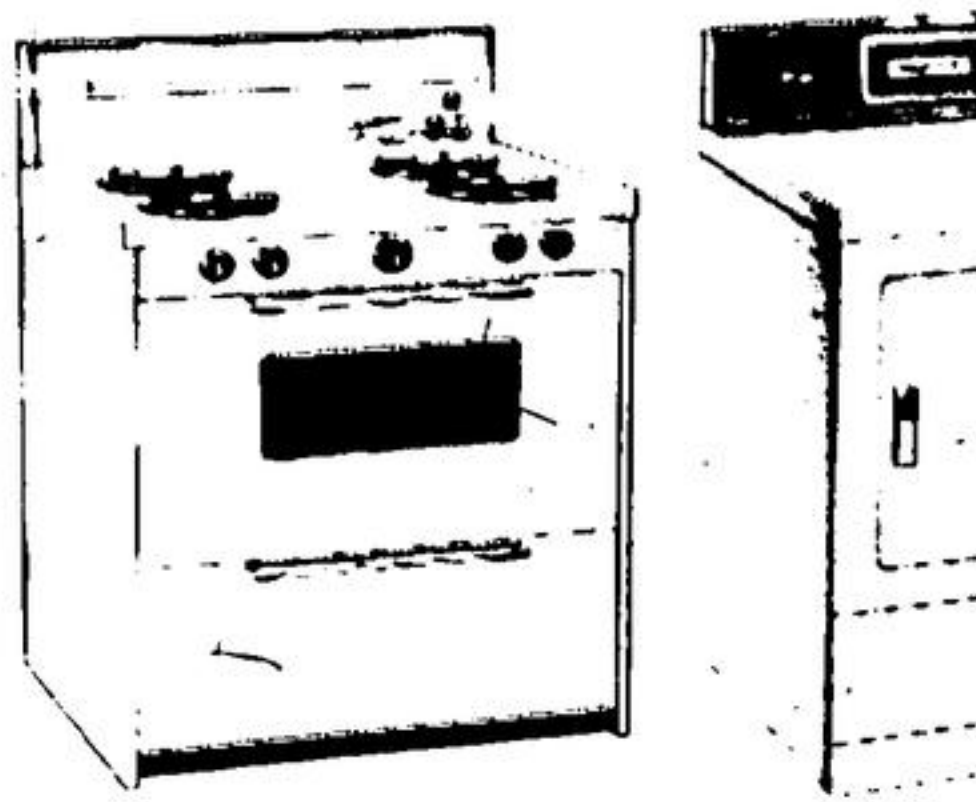
