The truck snow plow with two way box and sander was awarded to Halton Truck International on the recommendation of the Department, of Highways representative. The bid was

Halton Truck was the second highest of the four tenders. submitted but it was the only truck which met all of the

F.W.D. Truck Sales, Milton, was the highest tender with \$23,231.00. Thompson Motors (Ford), Acton, at \$19,890.41. and Masson Motors (G.M.C.) Georgetown at \$19,530.68 were ower bids but neither was up to specifications.

The contract for road construction on the Eighth Line

Esquesing, was awarded to Armstrong Brotherk, Brampton, with a bid of \$41,387:30. The decision, recommended by the Department of Highways over Kings Paving at \$51,728.20, was based on the lower price and previous experience with the

The construction is to be finished in 30 working days. The company has two weeks grace between the time of approval and the actual start of construction which will mean completion of the road by the middle of November.
