

Open House at Elm Tree Farm attracts interested crowds on Saturday, Sunday

The colors of the rustling Nassagaweya countryside were reflected last weekend indoors, when an artistic family and one artistic guest arranged an exhibit and sale that delighted hundreds of visitors.

favor of fabrics and tile, she is returning to it again, she explains.

Their shed-turned-workshop was jam-packed with attractive articles for sale.

The latest artist in the family, pert daughter, Martha, set up a demonstration area at one end by a big window. A pottery enthusiast, she demonstrated throwing the clay and shaping small pots for many interested hobbyists who watched. She had some of her pots, bowls and

mugs for sale with warm, muted tones of nature chosen for her glazes.

Her drawings tacked along the walls were joined by a huge, colorful papier mache sculpture that she'd made as a class project. She's an art student at Sir George Williams University in Montreal.

She had the three amusingly contorted figures all moulded and painted before she really began to tackle the problem of how she's get it out of her room

and over to her instructor, she laughed. She finally found a friend with a big car, as it was no proposition for the Metro.

If you can count the flock of Hoey sheep as part of the family they were there, too represented by thick sheepskins in natural, blacks, browns and beiges for sale.

Joining the Hoeyes at the annual fall sale was Guelph artist Marie Harney. She spends the cool part of the year in Guelph and her summer in the

Maritimes, and many of her excellent paintings were of the sea shore and fishing villages.

She also had intricately wrought silver jewellery for sale.

Afternoon tea consisted of tea or coffee with a plate of crackers, cheese carved from a round, and a dollop of hot mustard-and-bean pickles. In charge were the Hoeyes' other daughter, Carolyn, Mrs. McIlwraith of Milton, with her husband.

The Elm Tree Farm Open House drew large crowds on Saturday and Sunday to the lovely location near Moffat.

Michael lost his life in a Toronto accident the previous Saturday when the car he was driving was in collision on Dundas Street with another vehicle driven by a Cookville man. A passenger, Murray Pew of 245 Guelph Street was injured in the crash.

Michael, who was the son of William and Marion Jeffrey, was born in Toronto, lived in Georgetown for two years when he was a baby, later in Acton until 1963, and since then in Georgetown.

He attended M.Z. Bennett public school, Acton and Georgetown Kennedy public school, and later Georgetown

district high school.

He had been employed with Phillips Chrysler Dodge and for the past year with the Abitibi Provincial paper mill.

Besides his parents he leaves five brothers and sisters, Sheila, Richard, Mark, David and Lisa and his grandmother Mrs. William Jeffrey, 5 Emery Street.

Father Otger DeVent conducted the funeral mass. Mrs. R. Burke was soloist and Mrs. George Hewson organist. Pallbearers were Jim and Leroy Pew, Donald York, Stephen Rayner and John Holmes and Gordon Payne of Bramalea. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

Let's Play Bridge

It's sometimes easy to see how to play a hand when you are looking at all four hands such as in this column. If you were at the table you could only see two hands. Cover the West and South hands and see what you would play as East when your partner leads the three of spades against a three no trump contract.

This hand was played at the Acton Bridge Club. East-West were vulnerable and South dealt.

king-ten or even ace-king-ten. Since these holdings are much more likely than partner holding just the ace and king, East's best play is the nine.

Now all this sounds fine in print but would you really make this play at the table. When this hand was played every declarer at three no trump made an overtrick. Conclusion no East played his spades the best way.

If East had just two small spades with the queen, then he is forced to play the queen. With queen ten it's easy to play the ten, but with queen-nine, it takes a good bridge player to put in the nine on the opening lead.
