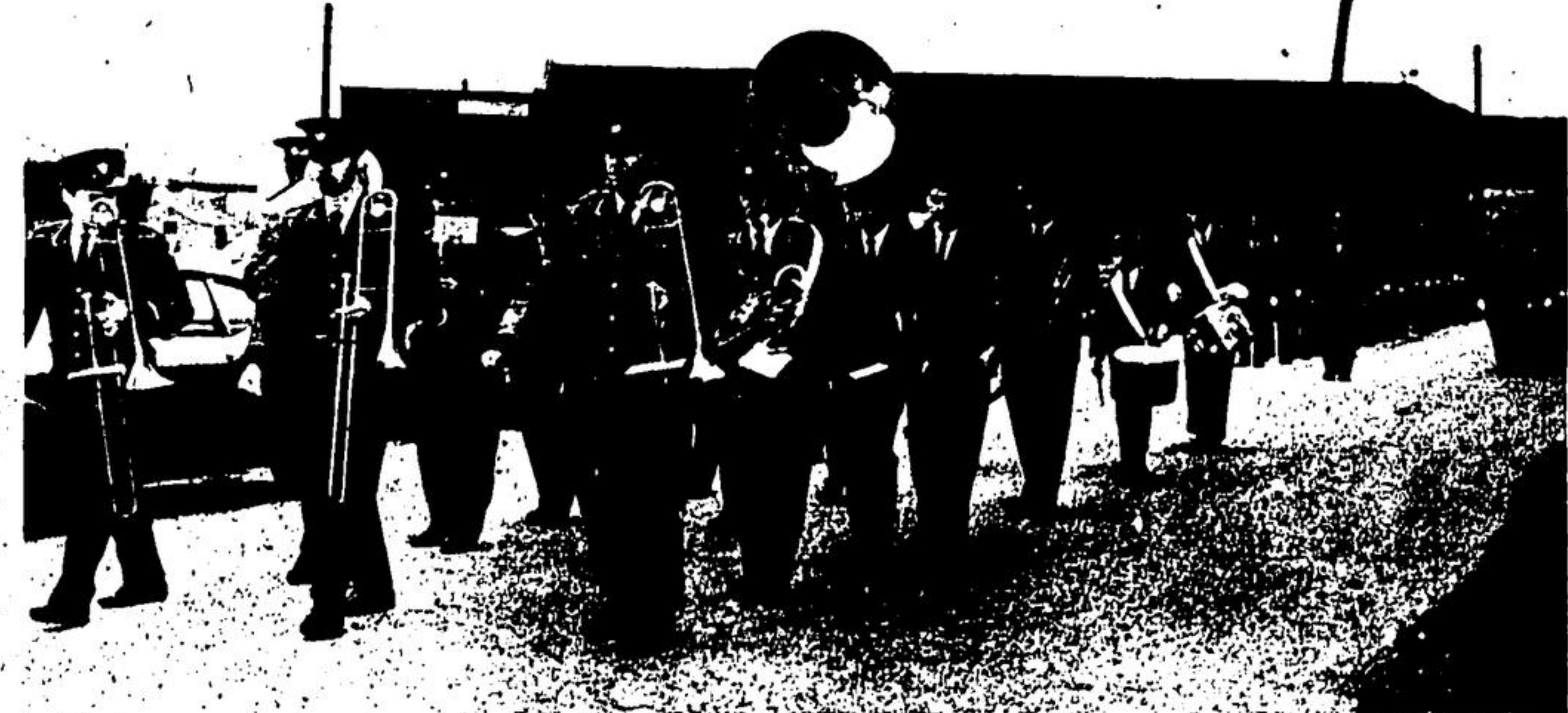
BIG FOUR
