

10 teams in O.H.A. Int. 'B' race

It could be a banner season for O.H.A. Intermediate B hockey. Ten teams are entered in the Western division.

Big surprise in the league was the revival of the defunct Georgetown intermediate club which will play in the same group as Acton Tanners.

A meeting in Harriston Monday night decided 10 teams would be an unwieldy group so they split the league in two geographically distributed groups of five teams each. Clubs will play an interlocking schedule, however, so fans will have a chance to see all the teams in action.

Group A will consist of Port Elgin, Lucan-Hilderton, Seaford, Elmira and Durham.

Group B will be made up of Acton, Georgetown, Cheltenham, Hespeler and Fergus.

The proposed schedule would include 26 games, consisting of two games away and two at home with each team in a club's own grouping, and a home-and-away game with each club in the other group.

All the decisions made at Monday's meeting are subject to the approval of the O.H.A. executive which meets this Friday night. If they give the proposed groupings a green light, convener Bob Braithwaite will set up a schedule immediately and the club will start playing around the middle of November.

Acton Tanners were represented at Monday's meeting by Ross Ballentine and Roy Goodwin. Ross was again appointed league statistician.

Only the four top teams in each group will make the playoffs which will leave two teams standing in the cold when elimination time rolls around. All clubs in the league are Intermediate "B" with the exception of Port Elgin which is again classed as "C".

Although the entry of a Georgetown club was the big news in this area, O.H.A. officials are happy with new teams from Elmira and Lucan and the re-entry of Fergus after a year's absence.

Georgetown's entry will mean the Acton club will be denied use of players who have been toiling in Tanager livery for several seasons. Coach Harold Townsley will be handicapped in his first season in the coach's chair but he's not worrying too much. He's hoping this year's Acton club will be composed mainly of good young players from this district with a sprinkling of veterans to steady the team.

"Loaded guns must not be carried in, on, or discharged from aircraft, motor cars, motor boats or other vehicles."

The foregoing is a direct quotation from the Summary of Ontario Hunting Regulations entitled "Hunting '68". This publication is available at all Lands and Forests Offices and thousands of copies have been given out. In spite of all this, violations of this regulation continue to be common. Already more than twenty hunters in the Chapeau District alone have been charged with having loaded guns in boats and cars. Although these hunters may consider themselves most unfortunate for being "caught" they are among the lucky ones. We note from press reports that there have been two fatalities in Ontario caused by loaded guns in vehicles and the big game season is still young. Obey this regulation! You will avoid paying a needless fine, and losing your firearm. It could save your life!

Here is a list of a few more of the most common violations.

Remember it is ILLEGAL:

1. To have an uncased firearm after one half hour after sundown in an area inhabited by game. This also applies before one half hour before sunrise.
2. To discharge a firearm from a power boat unless the boat is beached or resting at anchor.
