This publication is available at all Lands and Forests Offices and thousands of copies have been given out. In spite of all this, violations of this regulation continue to be common. Already more than twenty hunters in the Chapleau District, alone have been charged with having loaded guns in boats and cars. Although these hunters may consider themselves most unfortunate for being "caught" they are among the lucky ones. We note from press reports that there have been two fatalities in Ontario caused by loaded guns in vehicles and the big game season is still young. Obey this regulation! You will avoid paying a needless fine, and losing your firearm. It could save your life!

Here is a list of a few more of the most common violations.

Remember it is ILLEGAL:

1. To have an uncased firearm after one half hour after sundown in an area inhabited by game. This also applies before one half hour before sunrise.

2. To discharge a firearm from a power boat unless the boat is beached or resting at anchor.
