Passenger train peels fender off waiting car

Like a key opening a sardine can, a CNR train peeled the fender and left side of the hood off a '68 car Thursday morning at the Mill St. crossing.

James Morgan of Guelph stopped his car on one track asthe morning passenger train passed, ripping off the bumper, twisting it at sharp right angles to the car. Shaken but not injured, Mr. Morgan sought temporary repairs for his car at John's Texaco service station, and continued on his way to Georgetown.

Bystanders felt if the car had been another inch closer, the impact might have jerked the car around and smashed it into the side of the train. . ;

A travelling alesman from Guelph, Mr. Morgan was travelling east on Mill St. Police who investigated, reported he intended to cross the tracks against the flashing red signal, saw the westbound train approaching and put on his brakes. He came to a stop on one set of track, and was struck by one of the cars on the train.

Mr. Morgan felt something projecting from one of the cars must have struck his vehicle in the spectacular accident. Spectators agreed it was several seconds after he had stopped. when the front of his car was pecied away.

There were 23 nominations from the floor at the annual nomination meeting, held Monday in the Robert Little auditorium.

Three were for the trio who have all already been campaigning for the mayor's seat, reeve Herbert II. Hinton, incumbent Leslie Duby and present councillor Robert Drinkwalter. All qualified to run before the Tuesday 9 p.m.

Deputy-reeve Frank Oakes was the only person nominated as reeve and received a round of applause from the 70-odd in attendance.

A father and son combination, appeared on the slates for a while as if they might oppose each other for the deputy-reeve's post, but Edward Tyler Sr. withdrew in favor of hydro commission, leaving son Edward Tyler Jr. in possession. The former councillor was also applauded by the audience as he promised to continue to act in Acton's best interests.

ELEVEN MEN were nominated for council. Two withdrew that evening and the eight who qualified are William Williams, Earl Masales, William Coats, John Greer, Garnet Mckenzie, Cyril Bishop, Peter Marks and Orval Chapman.

There are six council seats.

The two who withdrew before the meeting was over were Don Lindsay and Norman Elliott. Douglas Copeland did not qualify. (Present councillors missing from the next ballot are Bob Drinkwalter, hoping to move up to mayor; Ted Tyler Jr., promoted to deputy-reeve and Charles Perry, Mr. Perry is not certain where he will be working next year.)

Six were nominated for the four hydro commission seats, Jacob van der Kooy, Douglas Manning, Robert MacArthur, Wilfred McEachern, Orville Brown and Edward, Tyler Sr. and all six qualified. (The last three are presently on the commission 1

In response to a request from Parks Board and Recreation Committee, six boys from the Grade XI history class at Acton District high school are conducting a survey of recreation and educational

programs and facilities in town. Later the entire Grade XI class will analyze the results of the survey to determine the extent of existing recreational and educational facilities in Acton.

The Parks and recreation committee will use the student's findings to co-ordinate recreation and educational programs to avoid duplication, and initiate new programs, especially those which are subject to grants from the

provincial government. As part of the survey, questionnaires will be sent home with all elementary and high school students to establish what programs are now operating and

asking for suggestions. Students participating in the survey will be given credit for their work on the history course.
