The biggest expense is to Ontario Hydro for power, totalling \$221,921.27 in 1967 and \$188,166.72 to the end of September this year. In 1968 the cost of power was increased six per cent. "We were one of the few municipalities who didn't find it necessary to increase the cost to our customers."

"Last week we were advised that our cost had been increased again-this time 4.6 per cent. We feel, at this time, that the Commission • can absorb this additional increase without increasing your hydro rates." Acton's rates compare very favorably with other nearby

They installed 73 water heaters in 1967 and 69 so far in 1968. They have purchased a "Ditch Witch", billing machine and new service truck. The gang is kept to a minimum, and equipment keeps down the cost of labor.

Dr. Oakes commented it was indeed creditable if they could manage to absorb the increase without raising rates.

Questioned about Glenlea street lights, Mr. Tyler said many people believe lights are the decision of hydro, but actually the commission acts only on council instructions. He said the question should be referred to the proper person on council.

This produced a laugh when the responsible councillor turned out to be the commission chairman's son. Ted Tyler Jr. explained the budget for lights is just about all eaten up. Lighting in subdivisions will be improved under the new subdividers'

FOR PUBLIC school board, chairman Cyril Bishop expressed pride in the two schools. In 15 years the system has grown from

eight rooms to Robert Liftle school with five rooms in the stone school; 14 classrooms, kindergarten, home economics. room and shop, with library in December; and the M. Z. Bennett school with 12 rooms, and addition with gym, library, room, storage and four the board rep. classrooms by January or February.
