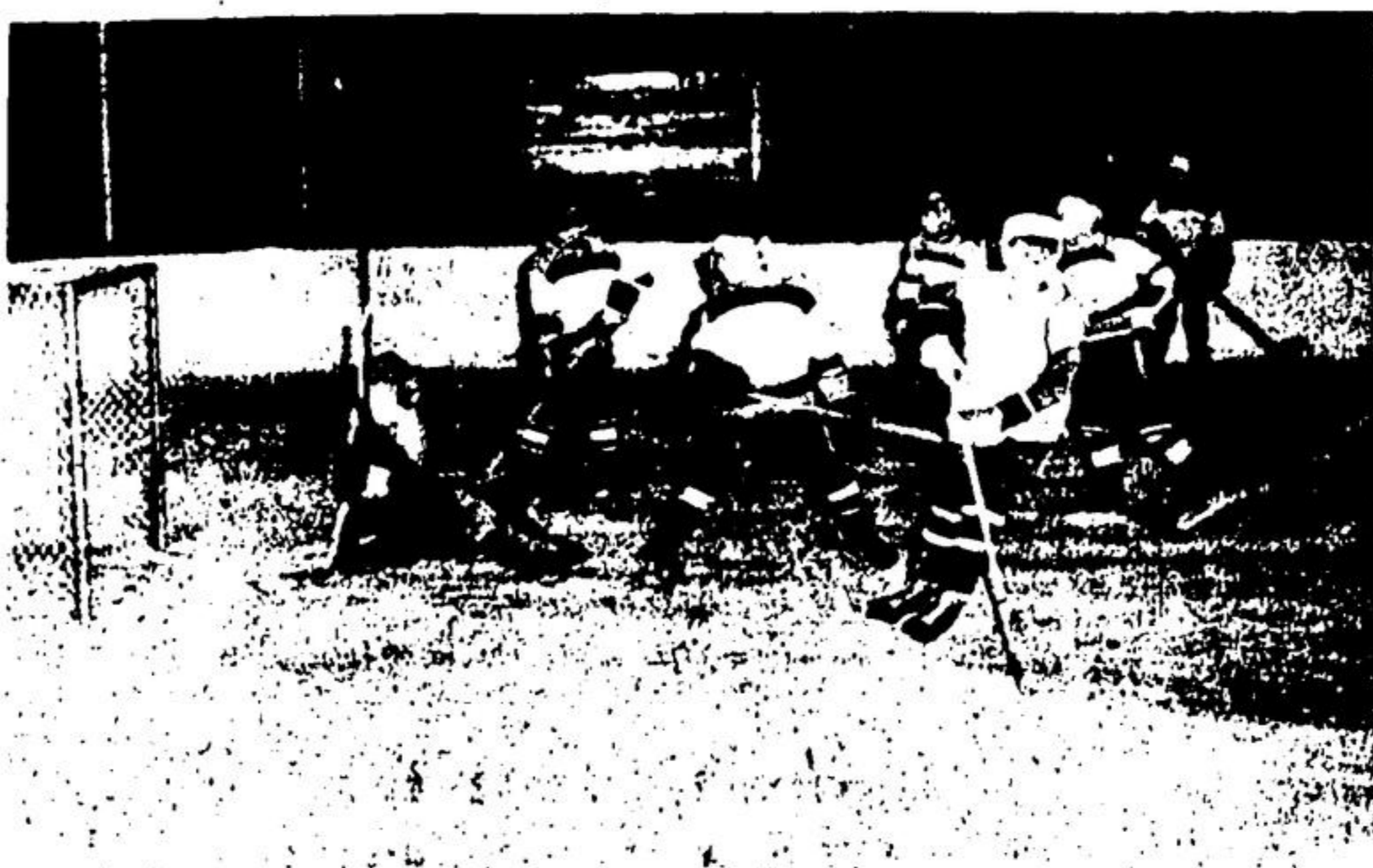


Legion league starts

Parents should promote safety for their children

One personal injury and four property damage accidents, five collisions in one week, caused \$2,010 property damage, while luckily, only one person received minor injuries.

The attitude of the officers at the Acton Detachment, following the recent high accident period, is probably best expressed as 16 charges were laid and only one warning issued during the 578 miles patrolled during the week Nov. 10 to 16. Seven criminal occurrences were logged, four being of a minor nature while the remainder were more serious. Another complaint of indecent exposure was reported in our area and a case of indecent assault was brought to a successful conclusion when a local man was charged with the latter offence. The other item was one of an attempted theft.

In the past week, members of the Acton O.P.P. have been privileged to attend ceremonies at both public schools in which school safety patrol captains have been presented with plaques, donated by a local service club, representing another accident free year during the school patrol hours.

The safety patrol members, the school staff and students, should indeed be proud of their outstanding records.

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Doug Latimer is new Crown

Douglas V. Latimer, a Georgetown lawyer, has been named as the new crown attorney for Halton County. The announcement Monday came after a lot of second guessing about who the new crown would be.

Ron Thomas has filled the position since Peter McWilliams retired to run for parliament last June. Thomas resigned two weeks ago when an offer for private practise came up.

Mr. Latimer is 39 years old and married, with a five-year-old son and a two-year-old daughter. He was educated in Georgetown Public School, Georgetown High School, University of Toronto and Osgoode Hall Law School.

Mr. Latimer is a former president of the Halton Progressive Conservative Association and has held a wide variety of positions with clubs and organizations dealing with community service.

He has practiced law in Georgetown since 1957 and is vice-president and a director of the Halton Law Association, a

member of the Legal Aid committee for Halton, and formerly served as a part time Crown Attorney. He is an associate member of the Ontario Crown Attorney's Association.

Mr. Latimer is a retired officer of the Royal Canadian Navy (reserve) where he specialized in communications. He is a member of Royal Canadian Military Institute and Georgetown Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion.

Mr. Latimer is active with St. John's United Church and has formerly held executive positions with Halton County Children's Aid Society, North Halton Cancer Society, North Halton High School Board and Georgetown and District High School Board.

He is a member of Georgetown Chamber of Commerce, a member of Empire Club and member and officer of several Masonic organizations.

His duties are expected to commence at the end of this month.



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
