Credit Union will expand

Acton and district members of the Milton-based Holy Rosary Parish Credit Union Ltd. will be attending a special meeting in Milton Sunday, when the group's members are expected to agree to formation of a community-wide credit union for Milton and area residents.

The 900-plus member organization, which has several shareholders in Acton and the north Halton district, has assets of over half a million dollars. Tentative approval has been received to expand the group to a community-wide service.

Holy Rosary's manager Jules Frjters of Acton reports the tentative approval received from the government allows residents of "Milton and vicinity" to join the proposed community credit union, so present members of the Holy Rosary group living in this area will continue to be eligible for memberships.
