Once the push-me-pull-you season starts, I know that the visiting season ish't far behind, and start to bake accordingly. Every year I resolve that the following year I'll bake my Christmas cakes in September, but I've never managed it yet. I'm usually rushing about; around the end of November, hoping the cakes will be ripened by Christmas. My usual recipe is

a little expensive, and takes a

while to mix up. It's quite good,

My prandmother sent me recipe for a quick type of cake that would be good for people who don't have too much time for baking, and who would like to cut down on expenses. I made it last week, and it took only 20 minutes to mix up. (You may reduce that by 5 minutes if you don't burn yourself, if you can remember where you put things, and if your heaters don't keep falling off). The texture was different, but the flavor was good and should get better.

DARK FRUIT CAKE

Sift together 2 cups allpurpose 214 tsp. cinnamon, 1/4 tsp. tsp. cloves, & tsp. nutmeg, & tsp. mace, &

Add 2 lb. raisins, 14 cups mixed peel or citron, 3/4 cup chopped dates, 3/4 cup quartered cherries Cream 1 cup butter well. Add 114

cups brown sugar. Beat 6 eggs well and add to butter mixture slowly. Add flour mixture alternately with 14 cup grape juice combined with 14 cup strong coffee. Mix thoroughly. Line pans with buttered brown paper. Fill half full. Bake at 300 degrees for 214 to 3 hours. Remove paper. Cool. Wrap in cheese-cloth soaked in rum or brandy to prevent mold. Store 4 weeks. (Note: I use an angel cake

OUICK DARK FRUIT CAKE

Sift 21/2 cups pastry flour, 1 tsp. baking sodu. Combine 2 eggs lightly beaten, 15 oz. can condensed milk, 3 cups mincement, I cup chopped walnuts, 2 cups mixed peel and cherries. Fold in dry ingredients. Line 9-inch tube pan with waxed paper, and butter it. Pour in batter. Bake in flow oven (300 degrees) for 2 hours. Turn out, remove paper. Store as cake above.
