HOW TO REPLACE LOST HUNTING LICENCES OR BACK PATCHES

Hunters who lost their current year's hunting licence or back patch can obtain a duplicate by writing to district offices of the department of lands and forests.

A replacement licence, plainly marked duplicate, with corresponding back patch, will be mailed upon receipt of a signed declaration of loss providing name, address, number of the lost licence or back patch and name and address of the issuer selling the lost licence. An issuing fee of 25 cents should accompany applications for replacement licences and/or back patches.

Local applications should be made to the Ontario Dept. of Lands and Forests, Beaverdale Road, Hespeler, Ont.

Some hunters are wondering why their driver's licence number is requested by issuers of hunting licences. Ontario drivers are assigned a permanent licence number and these are filed so that they can be retrieved very rapidly by computers. The same system can be used for hunting licences; new "auto pick" numbers as they are called, can be provided those who do not own a driver's licence. The system provides a very rapid means of obtaining information on lost licences or whether a licence applicant has held a previous licence. Immediate identification of hunters following the receipt of back patch numbers observed in the field is also possible; this is an important aspect of the back patch system which is designed to improve the behaviour of the few irresponsible hunters who cause problems afield.

GROUSE WINGS AND MOOSE JAWS

Each year the department of lands and forests solicits the help of sportsmen in obtaining information and specimens to aid in game management.

If one wing of every grouse shot is turned in to any conservation officer or nearest lands and forests office, the bird's age can be determined from the development and replacement of the wing feathers.

The department would also like to extend its appreciation to hunters who have brought in the lower jaws of deer and moose together with requested information.

The department is using the information (the area hunted, the date and sex of the animal taken), as well as the lower jaws, to arrive at various aspects of the hunt. At the end of the season, the collected data is examined and the department is made aware of the sex ratio of animals being taken, the location which is or isn't receiving hunting pressure, and the age structure of the animals.

This information, along with other data, then may be used to formulate management plans both for a district or a portion of the province. The ultimate objective is to see that the resource is utilized in a way that the maximum number of people derive the maximum benefit.

Jets spoil Tanner debut with 9-2 victory Friday
