### Longer, wider runs for Glen Eden skiers

Ski enthusiasts can enjoy smoother, wider, and longer runs at the Glen Eden Ski Club this season. The club at Kelso, operated by the Halton Region Conservation Authority, has already been working on improvements for the Dec. 21 opening.

Snow making machinery has been expanded from 800 feet to 1,500 feet, serving four ski runs. Approximately \$6,000 has been spent blasting new trails and widening old runs. The main hill has a vertical drop of 220

feet on a 1,200 foot long run, and is considerably longer than last year. There are trails winding through the wooded area for experts, steep runs for intermediates and gentler slopes for beginners.

Mr. Dahmel also hopes to form a ski club. He feels that then it might convince the H.R.C. to implement some of the luxuries the ski resort could use.

Hours of operation this winter are all day (10 a.m. to 5 p.m.) on Saturdays and Sundays, plus Wednesday afternoons from

1-4:30, and Wednesday and Friday evenings from 7-10. In addition, the tows will operate from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. during the Christmas holidays.

A new heater has been installed to melt snow in the pit. It may also be used to keep snow removal equipment from freezing up during the cold weather.

In reply to a request by Mr. Townsley, that the committee hire an additional man to aid himself and Don Price in operation of the arena, the committee instructed Mr. Townsley to prepare a detailed report on the schedules of all activities. They feel that a shift system can be arranged under the present conditions that will give both men less hours work.
