All badges presented will be in accordance with the new scout training "Scouts '68".

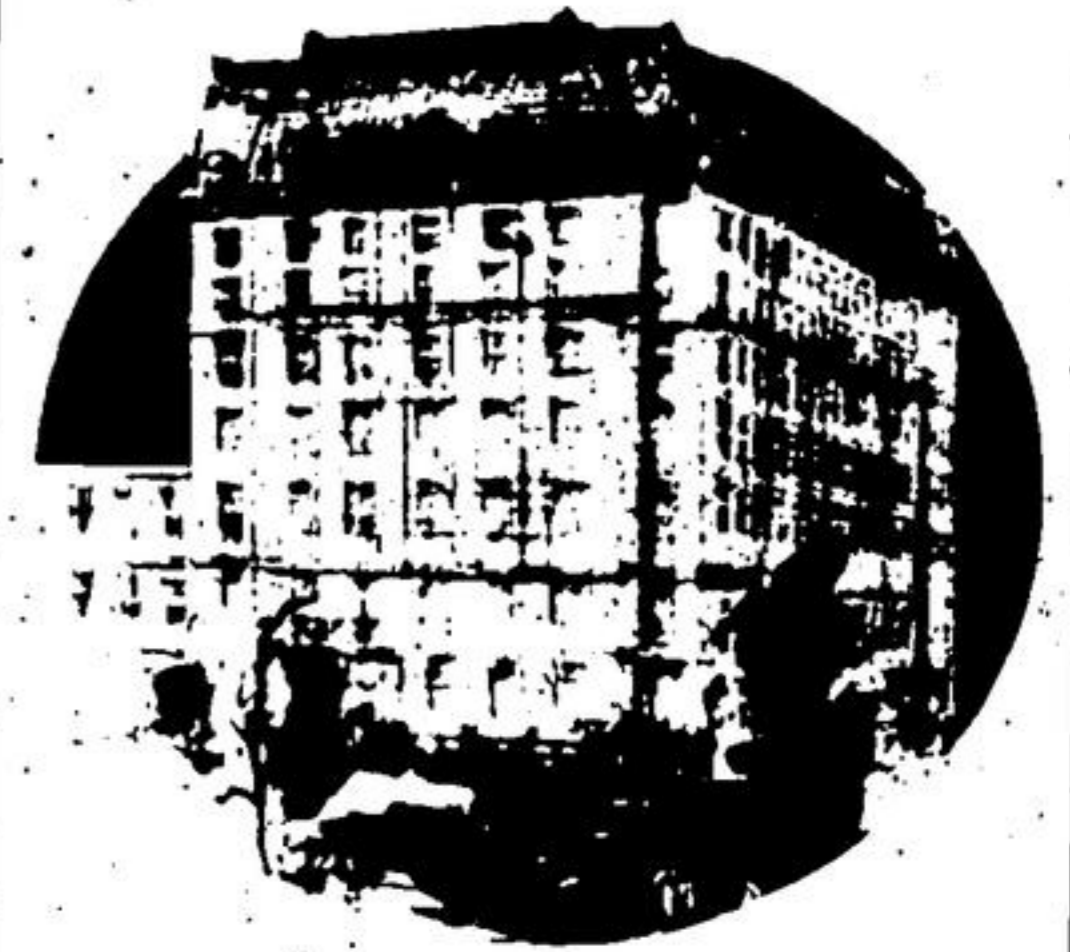
Flashing light drivers' warning

DURING THE Remembrance Day weekend, about 350 visited the Col. John McCrae birthplace in Guelph. The normal weekend attendance is between 50 to 60.

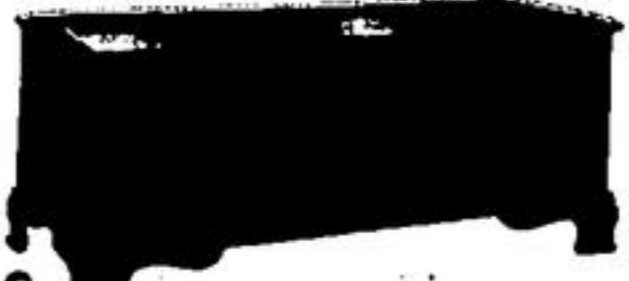
Presbytery givings

"This is my maiden speech as convener of Stewardship and Budget, but it will be no 'mini-budget'", commented the Rev. R. D. Duncanson of Norval to the Presbytery of Brampton of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, meeting in Boston Church near Milton on Tuesday, Nov. 19.

He revealed that the Presbytery's givings to the "Budget" (the outreach beyond the local congregation, including home and overseas missions) ranked 33rd out of the 48 presbyteries in the country. Thirty-two presbyteries reached or exceeded the national average but this one fell 90 cents per member below, giving only \$9.38 per member last year to the broader work of the Church. The speaker, in urging greater response, noted that this was true in one of the most favored parts of the country.

The court convened under the new moderator, Rev. D. S. Jackson, Port Credit, with its new Clerk, Rev. D. J. Berblion of Erin, assisting him.
