During the week of Nov. 17 to 23 inclusive officers of the O.P.P. attached to Milton Detachment worked a total of 872-3/4 hours and patrolled 7,806 miles on area roads. Twenty-five charges were laid under the Highway Traffic Act, and 20 warnings were issued to erring drivers.

A total of 26 general occurrences were investigated, including one trespassing complaint; three L.C.A. investigations resulting in six persons being charged; two missing person investigations; three thefts, one of which proved unfounded; one disturbance; two assaults; one wilful damage complaint resulting in one person being charged; and one person apprehended for having "Care and Control" of a vehicle while impaired.

Officers have been kept busy during this week investigating 44 accidents which were reported. Many of these were caused by the weekend snowfall. Twelve of the accidents investigated were personal injury accidents, resulting in injury to 21 persons. The remaining 32 were property damage accidents only, and total property damage in all accidents was estimated at \$24,285.

As a result of investigation into these accidents, 10 drivers were charged for infractions of the Highway Traffic Act. Drivers are urged to exercise utmost caution when the highways become slippery because of snow or ice. Please allow driving conditions to govern your speed.

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
