David, Susan Ontario's popular names

If your name is "David" or "Susan" you possess Ontario's most currently popular given name, reports Robert Welch, Ontario's Registrar General and Provincial Secretary. As prefixed double names, Joseph, Mary and Marie are the most popular.

Perhaps not since Shakespeare first posed the question: "What's in a name?" has so much information been accumulated on Christian or given names by means of data processing. The tabulation of given names was a by-product of indexing birth records by the Office of the Registrar General, whose business it is to record all births, marriages and deaths in the Province.

The tabulation concerned names given Ontario's 153,320 children born in the Province in 1964. Of the 75,881 boys born in that year, one out of every 20 was named "David", accounting for a total of 3,631. "Susan" was the name chosen for 1,653 girls out of a total of 74,406 born that year, making the name the most popular chosen for baby girls, or for one out of every 45 girls.

The ten most popular names chosen for boys, and which

accounted for a total of more than 24,000, were in order of popularity, and actual numbers, David (3,631), John (3,425), Robert (3,296), Michael (3,042), James (2,300), Paul (1,899), Mark (1,797), Richard (1,706), William (1,636), and Kevin (1,346).

Baby girls, or a total of 112,000 of them, were given the following names in order of popularity: Susan (1,653), Sandra (1,294), Lisa (1,162), Linda (1,118), Deborah (1,093), Patricia (1,087), Karen (1,016), Catherine (955), Christine (931), and Donna (891).

While the birth of boys exceeded girls by a slight 1,475 in numbers during 1964, the name tabulation indicates that parents use a much wider selection of names when it comes to a choice for their daughters.

Some names are popular for both sexes, such as Terry, chosen for 410 boys and 89 girls; Leslie, chosen for 118 boys and 285 girls; Robin for 128 boys and 284 girls; and Kelly for 702 girls and 96 boys.

One interesting highlight of the tabulation was the many given names that reflect the increasing number of Ontario newcomers from European countries, especially the Latin countries, and other nations. Many children's names from these countries are prefixed with the given names Joseph, Mary or Marie. The tabulation showed that there were 3,340 boys prefixed with the "J" for Joseph, and a total of 4,708 girls prefixed with the letter "M" for Mary or Marie.

It could thereby be claimed that while the names David and Susan were the most popular single given names, names prefixed by Joseph, Mary or Marie were by far the most popular double names. Because of the limited column field in the punch card for surname and

given name, the Registrar General's Office decided to convert these names to initial form, and so allow other given names to be punched in the index card. Only 25 boys' names were prefixed with the French "Jean", though 181 boys were given Jean as a single name.

The remaining 25 most popular names for boys—many denoting biblical usage—in order of choice are: Brian, Steven,

Stephen, Daniel, Peter, Christopher, Jeffrey, Timothy, Kenneth, Ronald, Donald, Thomas, Douglas, Scott and Gregory.

The remaining 25 most popular names for girls in 1964 were: Brenda, Elizabeth, Kimberly, Barbara, Nancy, Heather, Kelly, Wendy, Cheryl, Sharon, Jennifer, Lori, Jacquelin, Laura and Carol.
