Let's Play Bridge

Any play that is available to declarer is also available to the defense. Usually one thinks of squeezes, cross ruffs, hold up plays etc. to be plays for making a contract. Occasionally the tables are turned and the defense uses them against declarer.

A hold up play, as used by declarer, is a play to break communication between defenders. When the defense uses it, it is to break communication between declarer and dummy.

This example came up in a rubber bridge game. Declarer made three no trump when the defense failed to break the communication link.

South dealt and North-South were vulnerable.

Opening lead - 3 of diamonds.
South valued his hand at 19

points after adding one point for his fifth heart. This made his hand too strong for a one no trump opening bid. When he rebid two no trump showing 19 to 21 points, North carried on to game since the partnership must have at least 26 points.

Perhaps West should still have led a heart but after hearing South bid the suit, West decided to try his other four card suit. South won the opening lead with the queen of diamonds and took stock. He had seven tricks in high cards and needed only to develop two more. Spades seemed to offer the best chance since his jack-eight of spades solidified the suit.

The spade jack is led and passed to East who should refuse the trick. The eight of spades comes next and it also is passed to East but this time East wins. Now declarer is finished.

A diamond return drives out declarer's ace. There is only one entry to dummy and that is not enough to set up spades and get there to take the tricks. Declarer can get only eight tricks on the hand.

How different if East wins the first spade lead. Now, when declarer gets back in with the diamond ace, after he holds up, he can lead the spade eight and play the nine from dummy. If East holds up, declarer simply plays the ace and a small spade setting up the last spade in dummy. The heart king provides an entry to it.

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'Steamer' Emmerson mayor of Georgetown

By a narrow majority, Wheldon "Steamer" Emmerson is Georgetown's new mayor. He has been a member of council. With 1322 votes Monday he defeated John Elliott, the former reeve, who polled 1251 and Bob Francis 1047.

William Hunter had been acclaimed as reeve.

In the race for deputy-reeve incumbent Arthur Speight polled 2283 to William Sannucks' 1314.

Six councillors were elected, by wards.

In ward 1, Sandy McKenzie 800 and Ern Hyde 764 were elected; Michael Foote polled 434.

In ward 2 Mrs. Donna Denison headed to poll with 548 followed by William Smith with 466 to win the seats. They were followed by Jim Court 334, Jim Emmerson 318, Jim Young 303 and John Hole 217.

In ward 3 the two elected were Richard Morrow 687 and Harry Levy 488, followed by Philip Siddall 477 and Frank Tyrrell 203.

For the one seat on the Halton Board of Education Ernest Bodner polled 1723 votes and Gudni Sigurdson 1387.

Ben Boyle, a member of the separate school board, polled 265 to defeat Ed Hayes 125.

R.C. voters in Georgetown polled for separate school board of education Hugh Henderson 172, Kenneth Walsh 150 to fill the seats. Losers were Hubert Clohocy 125 and William Priestner 126.

There was a 50 per cent vote in Georgetown.

Already elected by acclamation were hydro commissioners John T. Armstrong and Gerald McCallum; and water commissioners Roy Ballentine and Winston Smith.
