Close meeting to discuss procedures, personnel policy

The new County Board of Education, replacement for all school boards within Halton, highlighted its inaugural business discussions with debate and deletions from a proposed agenda and a closed meeting on the procedures to be followed in appointing the Director of Education, Superintendents and Assistant Superintendents.

Before closing the meeting to the inaugural meeting guests present, the Board agreed its chairman Fred Armitage and vice-chairman Douglas Wood and Thomas Watson would be elected for a term ending January 1, 1970.

The Board also decided against standing committees, opting instead for the ad hoc committee system to deal with specific needs reporting to the full Board. It was pointed out by Trustee Bruce Edwards the success of the system depended on the circulation of the report to all members prior to the full Board discussion.

Trustee Liberty Pease proposed an ad hoc committee be established to deal with the procedures involved in appointing a Director of Education, and the recommendation of an individual.

Objecting to this procedure, Trustee Leonard Palmer insisted he did not want to be a rubber stamp for decisions and had opposed the system of ad hoc committees with this in mind.

At this point the Board voted to close the meeting for a discussion of personnel procedure and guests moved to the cafeteria in the County Building for lunch.

The Board adjourned 70 minutes later and Chairman Armitage refused to divulge the nature of the discussions or the content of a resolution approved by the Board. He told the press the Board would reconvene Saturday morning at 9 a.m.—again in Committee—for further discussion.

Questioned about the Board's policy on open meetings, Mr. Armitage declared it would be the intent of the Board to make as much of each meeting open as possible. He suggested personnel and property discussions were normally closed.

The chairman indicated the Board had not completed its agenda, which had also provided for discussion on meeting times and schedules as well as target dates for appointments and policy decisions.

Early in the meeting, during

consideration of the proposed agenda, the Board had deleted consideration of matters to be referred to ad hoc committees and the constitution of present school boards as advisory groups until June, 1969.
