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the people know," said Mr. Tyler. "Are they making full use of all the activities now?" Vice-chairman Brendan Aherne thought the survey showed there were some big gaps in the recreation program especially for teen-age girls.

"This emphasizes the committee has taken the initiative to co-operate and pool resources to get a program going that will meet the needs," Hugh Patterson observed. He suggested a satellite committee be formed

to report to the Recreation Committee regularly. Committee members agreed but felt no action could be taken this year. Chairman Goy said it would be up to next year's board to make the decisions.

The committee also:

- * Agreed to hire additional help to carry out the arena schedule for 20 hours a week at \$2 an hour.

- * Raised the secretary's wages by \$5 a week.

* Agreed arena manager Harold Townsley and his assistant Don Price should receive Christmas vouchers in the amount of \$10 as a token of appreciation.

* Passed a resolution recommending Murray Smith and Phil McCristall as replacements for retiring members of the Committee. The selection was based on a ballot. The new members will replace the chairman Mr. Goy, and Art Cooper who resigned earlier. Council must endorse the recommendations.

The chairman said he felt the committee needed an infusion of new blood and was resigning to make way. He felt the committee had covered a lot of ground in the years he had served and expressed confidence in its future.

Mr. Goy presided at the final meeting which was attended by members B. Aherne, H. Patterson, H. Dodds and T. Tyler.

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Power overload solved by 300 amp disconnects

New 300 amp. disconnects to replace present 200 amp. should solve Acton's overload problem, it was decided at the regular meeting of the Hydro Commission on Thursday night.

Following last week's two-hour black-out, a check of all phases (wires) made and power redistributed more evenly of the present disconnects. However, some are running at 190 on 200 amp fuses which leaves only a small margin against blow-outs. With 300 amp fuses the risk of overload is considerably lower. The 300 amp fuses are the maximum possible with the present power station facilities. To cope with future demands, the commission passed a motion to go ahead with negotiations as

discussed at the meeting for the location of a new station.

In view of increased costs to the commission for reading water meters, a motion was passed to advise the town that the cost will be 27 cents instead of the present 10 cents. The street and lights committee may decide to get the readings by a different method if they choose. Les Duly commented that Acton Boulevard is poorly lit and could prove dangerous now that students in M.Z. Bennett school are going home later in the evening. Doug Mason agreed it is the poorest lit street in town and suggested double arm streetlights could solve the problem. The matter is to be discussed in council.

O.M.B. allows appeal by Rubin Corporation

At the hearing in the town hall, the Ontario Municipal Board allowed an appeal by Rubin Corporation Ltd., against the decision of Acton's committee of adjustment. The committee's previous decision is thus set aside.

The board noted in its judgment, however, "at the same time it is observed that this is at least the second occasion upon which the same applicant has involved public bodies in hearings as a result of hasty and thoughtless action and it is to be hoped that more care will be

exercised in future to see that regulations are properly complied with."

The town of Acton supported Rubin Corporation's application to sever Lot 133 and combine the south and north halves of Lots 134 and 135, Plan 603, on the grounds that "the Rubin Corp. failed to submit the necessary application" before erecting the foundation on these lots.

The OMB said "the reason given would indicate a feeling on the part of the committee that it was without jurisdiction for there was no objection and the municipality strongly supported the application."

The board said the committee "had ample jurisdiction and should in fact have approved the application."

Lots 134 and 135 face on Elizabeth St. where services are not available. It was the town's suggestion to combine the halves of each lot so as to create building lots on Elmore Dr., where services are available. The north half of Lot 133, facing on Elmore Dr., would be severed and the remainder conveyed to the town for public purposes.
