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National tar-nicotine study to choose your health hazard

As a help to hooked but health-concerned smokers, the Minister of National Health and Welfare John Mumo recently published a table of tar and nicotine levels in eigarettes sold in Canada.

Tests were carried out during the first half of 1968 on 84 different types of cigarettes. The purpose is to enable smokers to , avoid those brands most injurious to health if they wish.

Mr. Monro summed up the report: "My Department's position is unchanged. Cigarette smoking is a serious health hazard. We know of no safe eigarette and no safe way to smoke, and we strongly tige that Canadians avoid eigarette smoking entirely. Nevertheless, many people find it difficult to stop smoking and we feel it is important to help them to reduce the inhalation of cigarette smoke constituents into their lungs.".
