## Goy's goal saves Nielsen's Lakeview trounces Heller's

### Industrial league

CLOSE TO TWO THOUSAND IN METRO TORONTO AREA WROTE HUNTER SAFETY TEST IN OCTOBER

A record 2,567 applications were received in Lake Simcoe Forest District during October from persons wishing to take the department of lands and forests examination which is necessary before a hunting licence can be obtained. Of this total, 605 failed to appear so that the actual number tested was 1,962.

The examination consists of 20 true and false questions and 20 multiple choice questions as well as a practical test which is taken under the supervision of a department examining officer.

The passing mark is 80 per cent on the written portion of the examination paper. If the applicant passes this part of the test successfully he is permitted to take the practical test. He must demonstrate to the examining officer that he is familiar with the basic fundamentals of safe gun handling.

Many of the applicants from Lake Simcoe District came ill-prepared as indicated by the failure rate which fluctuated between 25 and 30 per cent since the program was initiated. However, most of those who received instruction from a qualified hunter safety instructor before trying the examination passed without too much difficulty.

Lands and forests officers suggest that any first time hunter would be well advised to enroll in a hunter safety training course before attempting the examination. It is mandatory for each applicant under 20 years of age to take a course from a qualified instructor. Those over 20 may make application to be tested without benefit of such a course, but department records indicate the failure rate is greatest among them.

MILD WEATHER SLOWED EARLY MOOSE HUNT

Preliminary reports received by the department of lands and forests suggest that the Province's early moose hunt was not quite as successful as in previous years. In most areas there was no shortage of moose but the weather was uncooperative.

Hunting by boat and canoe is never as effective when water levels are high, and water levels this year were at record heights. In addition, the mild and rainy weather seemed more like summertime than moose hunting time.

However, many hunters were successful in spite of the difficulties, and success rates varied from slightly below normal in Sioux Lookout Forest District to slightly above normal in Port Arthur Forest District. In northeastern Ontario there was little change from the success of last year.

An aerial inventory last winter revealed good moose densities throughout most of northern Ontario. Since weather reduced early season success, there should be plenty of moose available to hunters during the late season.
