Hear planners report

Nassagaweya inaugural meet

In a four and one-half hour assembly that stretched to within a few minutes of midnight, Nassagaweya Township Council held its inaugural meeting Monday evening.

The new council, including former deputy-reeve William Hoey as Reeve, former councillor Mrs. A. MacArthur as deputy-reeve and new councillors Gordon Agnew, Art Gibson and James Watson, was officially sworn in by township clerk Cal McIntyre.

Rev. R. Finley of Ebenezer United Church led in prayer following the oath of office. Reeve Hoey welcomed several visitors to the meeting.

Following the reading of unusually lengthy minutes of the last 1968 meeting, Councillor Gibson suggested the minutes be printed and mailed to councillors prior to the meeting for study.

He was appointed to investigate and report on prices of reproduction machines for the next council gathering.

Maurice F. Newton, chairman of the planning board, delivered that body's year-end report to council.

...noting the finalization of the township's official plan, amending of By-law 11-67, and erection of some traffic signs.

It is anticipated the planning board will require less funds in the coming year than over the past three years, during which time large sums had to be paid professional help in connection with drawing and acceptance of the official plan.

Mr. Newton, also chairman of the committee of adjustment, noted 62 appeals were heard by the committee; with 25 conveys, one variance and 36 denials.

Of the 36 denials, 21 were appealed to the Ontario Municipal Board. Eighteen of them were denied, and two are still awaiting sittings of the O.M.B.

Township resident Gus Goutowski appeared before council to ask for conciliatory action on the outdated and limited telephone service within the township.

It was noted there are lines within the township shared by up to 10 parties, and the 854 exchange enjoys free dialing to only Milton.

Later, correspondence was received from Bell Canada stating it was considering increasing the rates within this area.

Council decided to request a representative of the company to come to a meeting and discuss the situation.

Zoning administrator S. W. Savage made his report for 1968, noting the total for 1967 excluding the \$265,000 Brookville school addition was \$400,000, a 10 per cent increase over 1966.

Council adjourned to meet as a committee-of-the-whole in lengthy sessions during which appointments and salaries of township employees was discussed, prior to passing of applicable by-laws.

At reconvention as council, by-laws were passed ratifying the appointments; and stipulating salaries.

A by-law was also passed authorizing the borrowing, as necessary, from a bank of funds to be later collected in taxes.

A letter will be sent to the County of Halton explaining the township has no objection to the closing of an unused portion of the county road of No. 25 Sidroad in the 4th Concession, following the county's query.

Township membership in the Ontario Good Roads Association, Association of Mayors and Reeves, North Halton Urban Board and Ontario Association of Rural Municipalities was reaffirmed.

4,271 campers

Rockwood park attracts 45,119 visitors in 1968

Attendance at the six parks operated by the Grand River Conservation Authority jumped 25 per cent in 1968.

A total of 411,605 persons visited the parks, an increase of 81,545 over 1967. Authority officials credited the beautiful sunny summer weather and better facilities at the parks for the increased attendance. Total revenue was up proportionately.

Rockwood Conservation Area was fourth in attendance figures with 45,119 day visitors, 4,271 campers and \$14,811 in revenue. This compares with 32,000 day visitors in 1967 and \$9,093 in receipts. Camping facilities were added to the Rockwood park in 1968.

Flora Gorge Park, busiest of the Authority's recreation areas,

retained its lead by attracting 98,036 visitors and 38,711 campers in 1968. It earned \$45,130 during the year. In 1967, the famed Gorge Park had 85,000 visitors, 32,340 and earned \$38,662.

Figures for the other four parks, with the 1967 figures in parenthesis, are:

Pinehurst, south of Galt, 84,837 (73,000) day visitors, 23,944 (12,700) campers, and \$33,378 (\$23,985) in revenue;

Byng Island, near Dunnville, 61,529 (45,000) day visitors, 27,791 (23,520) campers, and \$28,171 (24,041) in revenue;

Belwood lake, near Fergus, 26,793 (20,000) day visitors, and \$5,578 (\$5,019) in revenue;

Comestogo Lake, near Elmira, 6,573 (6,500) day visitors and \$1,825 (\$1,601) in revenue.
