There seems to be some doubt among local anglers about the new fishing licences in regard to ice fishing. As of January 1, 1969, all males 19 years of age and over must have a resident angling licence to fish. This includes ice fishing.

The licence fee is \$3 for the year. Smelt fishermen must also buy a licence this year. The fee for the licence to take smelt for personal use is \$1. The regular angling licence is not acceptable for the netting of smelt.

BACKPATCHES

In September 1968, the Department of Lands and Forests initiated the use of a numbered backpatch with the Resident Hunting Licence for small game.

The backpatch, 74" x 312" in size, with black numbers on a yellow background is to be worn in a conspicuous place on the back of the hunter. Wearing the backpatch on a cap is not acceptable.

There are several "Plastic pouches" on the market that may be purchased to carry the backpatch, but these plastic holders still have to be pinned on to the shirt, jacket or coat that the hunter is

wearing. The most sensible and practical way to wear the backpatch is to sew the backpatch in a piece of plastic on a light, full-fitting vest. These vests, available at nominal prices, should be blaze orange, yellow or red in color for an added safety feature.

The full fitting feature of the vest allows it to be worn over heavy hunting clothing in the cold weather and still may be worn comfortably in "shirt Sleeve" weather in the early fall.

Merely pinning the backpatch to the clothing will only result in its loss. A new licence must then be obtained at Lands and Forests

The purpose of the backpatch is to enable landowners, farmers, hunters and citizens to identify hunters who are trespassing. misbehaving or violating Game Laws. Already, several hunters who have acted in an unsportsmanlike manner have been brought to Justice through identification by means of the backpatch.

Hunters are reminded that Section 34(8) of the Game and Fish Act makes it compulsory for hunters to wear the backpatches. A four month "warning period", September to the end of December 1968, is in progress, but effective January 1, 1969, charges will be laid against hunters who are not wearing their backpatches in the

Increases in the population of Ontario and the corresponding increase in the number of hunters, especially in South-Western Ontario, aggravated by the loss of hunting areas to "Progress", has made it necessary to more effectively control the activities of

hunters. Hunters are asked to respect the rights of landowners and to obey safety rules and hunting regulations to keep hunting a safe and

pleasant sport.


