Let's Play Bridge

Slam hands play a very important part in rubber bridge. This is where the great swing hands occur. A thousand points can be won or lost on the bid or play in the slam zone. It is said that the Italians are the World-Champions of contract bridge because of their ability to get into borderline slams that are makeable and staying out of

those that don't make. This is not as true at duplicate bridge. At duplicate you can make just as many match points at a one club contract as you can in a grand slam. In fact I just saw at a tournament in Toronto a score where a pair who bid 6 diamonds and made an overtick received no match points. A bottom board in duplicate for hidding and making a slam. Everyone else was in 6 no trump

or 7 no trump for a better score. Since slams are more important to the rubber bridge player, special attention should be given to them by any serious bridge player. Even though they don't occur too frequently, they can account for most of the points won or lost.

This week I would like to discuss a special type of hid that can be used by any regular partnership. This is a bid to check on whether a grand slam is possible when a small slam is assured. It could have been used. last week at the Acton Bridge Club where this hand occurred. East-West were vulnerable and

South has a good opening bid of one heart and North has all the points required for a jump shift. After South supports diamonds, North tries Blackwood and discovers that his side has all the aces. A small slam in diamonds is assured but

what about a grand slam? North's bid of six clubs is called a Grand Slam Force. After checking for aces any bid at the six level is an unbid suit below the agreed suit is a Grand Slam Force. It's request is simple partner, if you hold two of the top three honors in the agreed trump suit bid seven.

Since South had both the king and queen of diamonds, he obeyed and bid seven. North went to seven no trump since he could count thirteen top tricks. You don't use the Grand Slam Force too often, but when it's needed it's worth a lot of points

Dear Sir: It would be humorous, if it wasn't so pathetic, to see traffic counters on County Road 15 in the Townships of Esquesing and Nassagaweya. No doubt there have been many complaints about the deplorable condition of this road, and so some 'wide-head' has decided for place traffic counters on it-to substantiate the County's reason for not bothering to strafeliten.

this road Of course the fact that weather conditions are such that only eventral traffic is using the road at this time is known by those responsible for this road. They wouldn't want the flow of traffic to the Mohawk, Sinday drivers, etc., to be recorded and so prove that the 15 Side Rd is more travelled than any other non-metalled County road in Northern Halton County

Some time earlier this year, disgusted with the lack of work on the 15 Side Road, observing the straightening, levelling, etc., going on on other side roads, I made a personal survey. I found this road is the only non-metalled (hard surfaced) County road above the Campbellville Side Rd. that goes anywhere in Halton County Other Side Rds (unmetalled) either start at a line, and die at a Highway, or vice-versa, 15 Side Rd, can be said to start at Georgetown (Stewarttown) No. 7 Highway, and finishes at No. 6 Highway, via 25 Highway and the Ainelph Line, yet only one




