

Biafra relief flight

GEORGETOWN. Two of the eight man crew flying Canada's only relief plane to Biafra, are Georgetown men, Roland Sparling, Duncan Drive and Dennis Hughes, Eleanor Crescent.

The Lockheed Super Constellation left from Montreal for the island of Sao Tome, in the Gulf of Guinea, five hundred miles from Biafra. From this volcanic island it will carry 21 tons of supplies nightly making two trips a night. The night flights are necessary to avoid unti-aircraft fire.

The plane was bought from Nordair, the only Canadian airline still operating the three tailed craft, for \$108,000. Operating cost for the three month venture will be close to \$500,000.

Most of the crew are Nordair employees on leave of absence except the two local men, who, as former employees, were asked by the pilot to come along. Mr. Sparling is mechanic engineer and Mr. Hughes electronic engineer.

The first Canadian civilian airlift of food and medicine into the beleagured country, was organized by a group of volunteer agencies and churches of all denominations across Canada, and is known as Canairelief. The move was sparked by the Overseas Relief Committee of the Presbyterian Church and Oxfam, but quickly gained the support of church groups of all denominations:

Sixth generation

Wellington County's 95th warden, Norman Isaac Roszell, reeve of Puslinch Township is a sixth generation county resident. He was formally elected to the high office by the 29 member 1969 council at its first meeting.

The \$3-year old Puslinch-born warden can trace his family tree back to his great grandfather, Steven Roszell who was born at Ballinafad in 1829, a brother of the first white child to be born in Wellington County, Benjamin Roszell, whose natal day was in 1821.

Steven was only two-years-old when the family moved from Erin Township to Puslinch where descendants have had a great deal to do with development of that area. The 1969 warden is a son of the late Fred Roszell, who was also reeve of the township in 1927 to 1931. His mother was the former Jane McAninch, so that in the three-way contest for the top county honor he defeated his first cousin, J. Leonard McAninch, reeve of Guelph Township. He has been a member of Wellington County council for five years, having served as reeve in the last three years and was deputy for two years 1964-65.

Kidnapped by eagle?

GEORGETOWN Ed Osborne, a farmer on the Eighth Line north of Georgetown, has started to look skyward for the answer to mysterious disappearances of pets and small livestock from his property.

A year ago, two small dogs suddenly disappeared, and a couple of faithful micers have also vanished without a trace though they never wandered far from home. .

Last week Buster a small Manchester Terrier, was let out of the furnhouse for a run. Despite his past history of being a home-sticker and never leaving the yard, this time he disappeared.

Mr. Osborne ties in the disappearances with recent sightings of a huge bird, which he said he originally took for an owl, but which his son Mark claims fits the description of a Golden Eagle.

If it is an eagle, it's likely the pets were plucked from the ground and carried off.

Mr. Osborne said it would explain scratch and bite marks on some of his small goats, and similar wounds on another hound. Last month sons Ed and Ted were approaching the farm in a car when a very large bird, which could have been an eagle, swooped low

Mr. Osborne has since moved his small goats into the barn and advises others in the area with pets or small livestock to do the same.
