# White Cane Week promotes need to value good vision

"If I had perfect vision for only a minute, even a garbage can would look beautiful," says W. K. Lawson, local Field Secretary for The Canadian National Institute for the Blind. He was reminding readers of the need to value good vision and to take care of it. He pointed out

that six Canadians lose their sight each day for a total of more than 2,000 a year. "That means that within four hours of reading this article," he said, "someone in Canada will become blind."

To underline the importance of good eye health, CNIB and the Canadian Council of the Blind, sponsors of White Cane Week Feb. 2 to 8 are devoting this annual education period to sight preservation and blindness prevention.

Sometimes the cause of blindness is beyond personal control. Diabetes is high on the list of causes, particularly among younger people. It affects the retina of the eye. "But CNIB is sponsoring several medical research programs on diabetes blindness and one day someone will solve this serious problem," the CNIB man said. "Appreciation of good vision cannot help here, but there are many areas where quick action and an awareness of good eye

health go hand in hand." He described a gardener who, one day last summer, was spraying weeds. The spraygun broke loose while in operation and shot the chemicals into the gardener's face. His eyes were his first thought and he wasted no time in washing them out with clean water. "As a result, his eyes enjoy full sight," the CNIB man said.

In contrast, he told of a man who was using a power saw in the basement workshop. The blade hit a hidden nail and a fragment of the metal went into his eye. "That man ought to have only one eye," the field secretary continued. "If he had valued his vision, he would have put on safety glasses before turning the switch."

"Be Wise, Take Care of Your Eyes" is this year's White Cane Week slogan but if the CNIB has its way, it would be first in any set of 40 commandments for good health.



Officers of Milton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, investigated five motor vehicle accidents during the past week. Two were personal injury accidents in which three persons sustained injury and the remaining seven resulted in property damage only. Total property damage was estimated at \$1,025.

Cases of accidents were by roads, improper passing, following too closely, failing to yield right of way, improper lane change, failing to stop at stop sign, improper parking and stopped driving. One accident resulted when a horse wandered onto the road. Investigation of these accidents resulted in seven charges being laid under the Highway Traffic Act.

Officers patrolled 10,134 miles on roads under the jurisdiction of Milton Detachment, and worked a total of 96 1/2 hours. Thirty-three charges were laid and 85 warnings were issued to drivers. Twenty occurrences of varying nature required investigation during this period. Included were three I.C.A. investigations leading to charges for two persons, one investigation under the Masters and Servants Act, one fraud, one trespassing complaint, one domestic complaint, one impaired driver was apprehended, and 5,100 worth of stolen property was recovered for other police.

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## K. Langdon Jr. heads lawyers

Georgetown lawyer Kenneth Langdon Jr. was elected president of Halton County Law Association last week as the association held its annual meeting.

Other officers elected include vice president P. W. Perras of Oakville, treasurer W. S. Strape of Milton and secretary Fred Leach of Oakville.

The association voiced its concern over insurance minister E. Benson's proposed changes in laws governing estate tax and succession duty.

Estates of persons who died after announcement of the intended changes are subject to the new regulations, but the insurance minister has not defined exactly what these regulations are.

Past president P. K. McWilliams stated the situation "shows an indifference to the interests of the people."
