

Drive carefully police plead

Acton O.P.P. Detachment personnel hoped local motorists would make New Years resolutions to drive more carefully in 1969, but apparently not.

Another accident during the week January 18 - 25 already has the January total up to 17.

We investigated only nine during the full month of January, 1968.

If local accidents continue to occur at the present rate, be assured your police force will obviously think more rigid enforcement a necessity.

Eight persons were charged with traffic violations, this week, as the cruiser patrolled 755 miles during 203 man hours worked.

In the non-traffic column only six occurrences were recorded and none of these were of a serious nature. Four persons were charged with infractions of the Liquor Control Act.

In view of the high number of recent accidents on our streets, this force would again like to emphasize the need for careful winter driving. Perhaps the following message, issued by the Ontario Department of Transport, will help you from being the next motorist involved in a motor vehicle accident.

DRIVERS! Winter driving need not be hazardous if you always adjust to winter conditions as they occur. The most common are: uncertain weather, poor visibility, slippery roads and longer hours of darkness. Extra care in driving is vital during the winter months. Winterize your driving! Avoid excessive speed... be alert for the driver who is not alert for you... Keep wipers and defrosters in tip top condition... and allow greater stopping distances on slippery surfaces. Remember... For safe winter driving, winterized driving is a basic necessity.

Wilfred McEachern new hydro chairman

Wilfred McEachern, who topped the polls in December's election, was appointed the new chairman of the Acton Hydro Commission at the second meeting of the new year last Thursday night.

Past chairman Ted Tyler Sr., absent due to illness, was appointed vice-chairman.

On standing committees; Finance - Wilf McEachern, Ted Tyler Sr., Bob McArthur; Property - Wilf McEachern, Mayor Les Doby, Orville Brown.

As one of his first official duties, Mr. McEachern signed cheques for the payment of accounts totalling \$344,084.

In discussing plans for the O.M.E.A. and A.M.E.U. Hydro Convention to be held at the Royal York on Mar. 2-5, it was decided to add a clause to the present resolution which would allow commissioners to be reimbursed for wages lost while attending the function.

Mayor Les Doby reported that since the council light and sanitation committee began investigating street-lighting in town, they have received several letters of complaint from various areas. "Unfortunately we can only do as our budget dictates," commented Mr. Doby. "We have to pick those that need attention the most." Doug Mason added that plans have been approved to put up extra lights across the children's cross-walk on Queen Street at Acton Boulevard.

Mr. McEachern said the new arrangement had been approved by both the provincial cabinet and Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation. Approvals from both bodies were required as Ottawa pays 50 per cent of any subsidy and the province 42.5 per cent.

Mr. Randall said it is expected the existing agreements will be amended in sufficient time so that the 1969 tax grants from O.H.C. to municipalities will reflect the change.

Provide more revenue from O.H.C. houses

Acton council's decision to go ahead with O.H.C. senior citizen and family geared-income housing projects on Cobblehill Road was made just ahead of a new financial arrangement for senior citizen projects announced by the Hon. Stanley J. Randall.

The new arrangement is expected to provide more tax revenue for municipalities having Ontario Housing Corporation senior citizen projects.

Mr. Randall, Minister responsible for O.H.C., said the revised financial arrangement will place senior citizen projects on the same basis as family housing projects - that is, the municipality will be paid grants in lieu of taxes which are equal to full normal taxes and it will contribute 7.5 per cent of any losses incurred by O.H.C.

Previously, all realty taxes on senior citizen projects in excess of \$25 per suite per annum were waived by the municipality.

Acton is planning 12 senior citizen units in the O.H.C. project.

Mr. Randall estimated the average net increase in tax revenue per unit per year would be about \$100 or, based on the present program of 6,448 units, an increase in revenue of more than \$600,000 per year for the municipalities having units after their share of the operating losses is paid.

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Elections, reports, presentations at St. Alban's annual vestry meeting

There were presentations, as well as reports and elections, at the annual vestry meeting of St. Alban's church on Sunday evening. About 30 attended the meeting with the Rev. Harry Dawson as chairman and Mrs. George Haggitt vestry clerk.

The rector conveyed his thanks to Fred New for his services to the church, and presented him with a warden's pin. Mr. New has retired as rector's warden.

Harold Denny was appointed the new rector's warden and received a pin from Mr. New. Don Lindsay also received a pin when he was elected for his

second term as people's warden. This was presented by Mr. Dawson.

Prior to the meeting every parishioner had received a copy of the financial report and the organizational reports for 1968, and copies were also distributed at the meeting.

The reports were accepted. The rector thanked the nomination committee headed by Mrs. J. Rol.

Rector's warden is Harold Denny; vestry clerk Mrs. Haggitt; board members Syd Newton, Paul Martindale, Vic Bristow, John Last; people's warden Don Lindsay; deputy warden Joseph Bray; lay delegates Pearl Rol, James McCulloch and William Denny;

chairman of side-men George Haggitt, members of the advisory board, Jens Laustsen, G. J. Smith, Cyril Bishop and David Hunter; auditor Syd Newton.

Mrs. New gave an "obligation report" - an approximate accounting on monies needed for next year's management. Mr. New thanked all organizations for their loyalty and hard work.
