

Let's Play

Usually the higher you raise your partner's opening hid, the more points you have but there is a limit to this. If your partner opens one of a major you raise to two with support and 6 to 9 points. You would raise to three with good support and 13 to.15

However the requirements for a raise to four are quite different. You should raise your partner straight to game if you have five or ux card trump support, a side suit singleton or void and fess than 10 high card points. This last requirement thay surprise you but that's the way it is in standard American

Of course you don't always make game but it's surprising how many times you can, and if you cannot, the opponents usually, could if you gave them buding toom.

Here is an example of this bid in action. The hand came up at the regular weekly duplicate game at the Acton Bridge Club last year.
