

The stiff competition against such perennial O.H.A. powerhouses as Seaforth, Elmira and Durham provided valuable experience for at least nine players, all of whom are under the age of 25 and all of whom are expected back next year. There's an excellent chance that this time next year they'll be forcing opponents into the same mistakes they may have made this year.

Furthermore, the season has proved that the executive, coach and players of the Acton Tanners are not a group that are easily discouraged, and this alone augurs

well for future seasons. We feel that the whole team, from the members of the executive, to coach Harold Townsley, to goaltender Jim Sweeney, who stopped a multitude of pucks this season, right down to each of the players who performed at various times, deserve a compliment for their perseverance, a compliment perhaps to replace the many slings and arrows critics have hurled at them this year.

In Four-town exhibition action, Kitchener Novices defeated the Acton boys 6-1 in an exhibition match on Feb. 23.


