"Fire Down Below" by Warren Armstrong is a collection of true exciting stories of the most disastrous fires aboard ship. ## Short 15 nurses Health Unit says

A shortage of 15 public health nurses on the Halton County Health Unit was acknowledged by the Unit in a report to the Personnel committee of County Council.

Reporting to the Personnel committee, chairman Rowen W. Hoey and Dr. L. Stuart M.O.H. told members a rough rule of thumb was that there should be a public health nurse for each 5,000 of population. "This would mean that we are short 15 Public Health Nurses", the committee report concluded.

The representatives outlined the responsibilities of registered nurses and public health nurses in the Unit's program. The Public Health Nurses visit assigned, schools and assist in immunization programs; make home visits and conduct pre-natal and post-natal home visits, do home nursing care for TB and Cancer patients, and conduct interviews regarding the mental behavior of children. Public Health Nurses are registered nurses with a certificate in public health.
