Layton himself admitted that he felt a sense of "unreality about the whole thing" as penelists Dean M. H. M. MacKinnon, Paul Couse and Prof. Panline Jewett groped to define the role of the university.

In an early morning panel moderated by television personality Patrick Watson the crowd was shocked by a comment from R. S. Richie, chairman of the university board of governors. He said, the recent events in Montreal in which more than \$1,000,000 in computer equipment was destroyed, should be regarded in our peneration as a reasonably normal phenomenon.

Mr. Richle maintained that policy makers at the university will have to realize that action of the sort that took place at Sir George William University is to be expected and must be dealt with accordingly.

Five acre building lots. are condoned, but illegal

The acceptability of five-acre building lots in the Township of Nassagaweys was discussed again last week as Council held their regular February meeting.

Sparked by a particular case brought up by Councillor James Watson, which Committee of Adjustment secretary S. W. Savage later commented on in committee of the whole, the controversy dates back to amendments made to the Zoning

by-law in early 1968. It was learned the township's official plan condones five-acre lots in some circumstances, but this approval was not wirtten into the amendments made to the by-law at that time.

Clerk C. McIntyre explained an amendment to the by-law is in the hands of planning board now, and will be coming to Council for consideration before

long; but the five-scre-lot clause could not be included in the 1968 amendments, finally passed last fall, because amendments approved by the Ontario Municipal Board had to be inserted first.

A number of councillors. including Reeve William Hoey, felt the Committee of Adjustment should have a little more direction from Council and Planning Board.

Councillor Watson also called for more flexible, and less literal use of the zoning by-law. "There has been just one voice for committee of adjustment for

quite a while," Deputy-Reeve Mrs. Anne MscArthur noted. A motion was made requesting Planning Board to send suggested amendments to the zoning by-law to council at their earliest convenience.
