For over 300 young hockey players from Acton, Milton, Georgetown and Fergus, this Saturday will mark the highlight of the entire hockey season. They'll start pouring into the Milton Arena in the early hours of Saturday morning for the annual Four Town Hockey Tournament.

The Four Town Tournament was organized in the early 1950's by a group of dedicated men who were interested in providing an opportunity for boys who had been playing in house leagues all season to put what they had learned to the test against competition from other towns

The four towns originally involved were Brampton, Orangeville, Milton and Georgetown. Later Acton replaced Brampton and Fergus was admitted when Orangeville dropped out.

Although the question has never been answered definitely, the Four Town Tournament is believed to be the longest continuous Minor Hockey tournament in the province.

Every year, each of the four towns pick an all-star team from their Novice (9 and 10 year olds), Pee-Wee (11 and 12 year olds) and Bantam (13 and 14 year olds) house leagues to play in the tournament. The teams are usually chosen in the early part of December so they can arrange exhibition games which will prepare them for the tournament which always takes place in March.

The site of the tournament rotates from town to town, and representatives of each town sit on a committee to draw up the schedule for the day. The town which hosts the tournament is also responsible for providing a meal for

the participants. Games begin at 7 o'clock in the morning and run through until 8:30 p.m. The winners of the first round games meet to play for the championship trophies, donated by the Georgetown Legion. The losers meet in consolution games, with the winners of these games receiving consolation championship crests. In addition, every player in the tournament is presented with a participant's crest.

Acton's three entries in this year's tournament are under the sponsorship of the Acton branch of the Royal Canadian Legion, while the Industrial Minerals Company, Goy Cartage, and Civiero Construction supply sweaters and socks.

The .ee-Wees are somewhat of a family affair, with .ill Fisher. Dale Fisher and Gary Fisher, all brothers, handling the reins.

Coach Stu McCulloch and Manager "Pop" Schuts guide the destinies of the Bantams.

The Bantams will be the first Acton team to take to the ice, when they tangle with Fergus at 10 o'clock. The Pee-Wees play Milton at 10:55 and the Novices take on' Georgetown at 11:50.

The tournament is a tribute to the original organizers and to men like Ted Pope, Gord James, Bob Louttet, Charlie Thomson and the many others who have kept it operating over the years.

But as even these men will tell you, Four Town Tournament Day belongs to the boys. Whether it's the games won, the games they should have won, the trophies, the crests, the delicious meal away from home or the new friends they made from other towns, the Four Town Tournament is a happy memory to think and talk about for the rest of the year.

So instead of taking advantage of some extra sleeping hours in the morning or lying on the couch watching that favorite movie on T.V. in the afternoon, drop down to the Milton arena this Saturday and give the boys some encouragement. The tournament deserves your support.


