The Acton club, trailing 2-0 scored at 12:50 of the third period and really put on the pressure in an effort to tie it up.

Kents started out the game strong until Scott Withers took a tripping penalty at 5:41 of the first stanza. While he was off high scoring Dean Baerg rapped a goal in for Beamsville. Action couldn't score when the home team played shorthanded at 9:05.

John McCutcheon was off for holding when John Hawey put Beamsville ahead 2-0 at the

13:33 mark of the second period. But McCutcheon got that one back for Kents at 12:50 of the third with a long slap shot from the point. John Sooyne relayed the puck to him.

Kents were the aggressive club all through the final stanza and went down trying their hardest.

Both clubs played well during the evenly matched series. Beamsville is now playing in the Novice B semi-finals against Fergus who won the first encounter 3-0.

SEVERAL TEAMS from the Tri-County Minor Hockey League are still in the running for O.M.H.A. championships. Milton Pee Wees have eliminated four teams and have advanced to the O.M.H.A. Pee Wee "A" final against the winner of the Canastota-Newmarket series. Milton bantams are in the Bantam "A" semi-finals against Byron. Chingacousy Juveniles are playing Whitby in the Juvenile "AA" semi-final, and the novices from the same town are in the Southern Zone 2 "AA" final against Waterloo.

Hesperley Midgets are battling Tillsonburg in the Midget "A" semi-final, while Brampton Novices have reached the Southern Zone 2 "AAA" Novice final against St. Catharines, and Streetsville Novices are playing Paris in the Southern Zone 2 "A" Novice semi-final.

Last year, the league boasted two Ontario champions and three Ontario finalists in addition to the Zone Championship brought home by our own Acton Novices and it appears that the league may even better this fine record this year.

LOCAL HOCKEY ENTHUSIASTS, who have been crying for an exhibition match between the Tanners and the Lions juveniles and predicting the outcome of such a game, one way or the other, will finally get a chance to see for themselves, this Thursday night, when the two teams will square off in the Acton Arena at 9 p.m.

Lions, after eliminating Merriton in three straight games, had exactly the same fate befall them against a very powerful Wingham Flyer squad and are now preparing themselves for the annual Tri-County Juvenile tournament, which opens in Milton March 29.

Tanners, of course, finished last in the Southern division of their O.H.A. Intermediate "B" league and missed the playoffs for the first time in recent years.

The game will provide a fine tournament tune-up for the Lions and will also give the corps of "Juvees" who are in their last year, a taste of intermediate competition for the first time.

For the Tanners, perhaps the game will provide a chance for their first win of the season.

The teams have agreed to keep rough play to a minimum, and the game has the sanction of both the O.H.A. and O.M.H.A.

No matter how you look at it, the result should be interesting and the game is sure to attract a large crowd.

Incidentally, the game was played in the Acton arena, and the Pee Wees turned in one of their best games of the year to earn a 5-1 victory.
