Film on Ecuador mission highlights Nassagaweya meet

The regular afternoon meeting of the Women's Missionary Society of Nassagaweya Presbyterian Church was held at the home of Mrs. John Roberts with the president, Mrs. Norris, in the chair. The poem, "Faith" was quoted and Mrs. Cox gave a prayer. The convenor, Mrs. Mullen, read the scriptures from John III, verses 1-17 and also from the book: "One Way for Modern Man". From these readings resulted the theme of the film "Meet my AVCA friends" which told of the life of missionaries in Ecuador and of their work with this backward tribe in the dense forests of South America. The offering was dedicated by Mrs. McLaren and Mrs. Pyatt gave the closing prayer. Mrs. Henderson conducted the Ladies' Aid meeting, starting with the pertinent quotation: "Giving our best today is the recipe for a better tomorrow." The hymn: "The Lord's my Shepherd, I'll not want," was sung and John 12, 1-11 read from the J. D. Phillips translation of the Bible. Mrs. Roberts read the minutes of the last meeting and arrangements were made for purchase of hives for Easter, and several quilting bees to be held. The meeting closed with the hymn, "What a Friend we Have in Jesus," and prayer. The hostess Mrs. Roberts and convenor Mrs. Mullen were thanked by Mrs. Cox, and a social hour followed.

World Day of Prayer observed by local ladies

A congregation of nearly 150 ladies gathered in Trinity United Church Friday afternoon to observe World Day of Prayer. Guest speaker was M.Z. Bennett teacher, Miss Cynthia Blades, who gave an inspiring talk on her homeland of Trinidad. Using a line from the national anthem "where every creed and race has an equal place," she explained how many different peoples have learned to live in harmony through inter-marriage and assimilation. While the majority of the population is colored, the culture is essentially British and all children must pass examinations set and marked by universities in England. Surprisingly, the largest church on Trinidad is not Anglican. According to Miss Blades, 40 per cent are Roman Catholics, 25 per cent Hindu, 20 per cent Presbyterian, and the remaining 15 per cent a variety of the various other protestant churches including Anglican. She stressed that while the world day of prayer is not observed in Trinidad, the women do have special church days on which all the various women's groups participate. She said that these women's groups are so powerful that the results of an election will be determined by which candidate the women support.

Responsive leaders were representatives of the various women's church groups in Acton: Mrs. Garnet McKenzie, the United Church; Miss Isabel Anderson, Knox Presbyterian; Mrs. V. Bristow, Anglican; Mrs. Charles Landsborough, Baptist; Mrs. John Kamminga, of the Christian Reformed; and Mrs. S. G. Thoman, Pentecostal. Mrs. Gordon Bell was soloist and Mrs. Clarence Denny played the organ. Last year, the services were held in more than 3,000 communities across Canada and in over 140 countries. The prayer offerings are used in a long list of Christian projects around the world.

The Bible today

Bible study groups, known as "Family Assemblies" were organized by the Catholic Church of Colombia in preparation for the World Eucharistic Congress held last August. In Medellin an elder of the Presbyterian Church visited such a group of some 60 people in a Catholic home near his own and joined in the Bible study. Hearing his comments during the discussion, the priest in charge said: "I would like you to teach these classes for us; you can teach the Bible and lead a discussion better than anyone else I know." In another area a laywoman who was in charge of a Family Assembly called on an evangelical pastor after her first session to ask him to teach her how to lead a Bible study. The pastor met with her every day, explaining the Scriptures and training her in the leadership of a Bible study group.
