ESQUEWING Township Council MEETS

At the regular meeting Monday night, Esquewing council:

- Took no action on an Ontario Humane Society request to oppose the contentious Bill 73. The Society contends the Bill interferes with municipal pounds and forces them to surrender animals to dealers after 48 hours confinement.
- Heard a request from the township planning board for a 1969 budget of \$5,000, \$2,000 of which was ticketed for professional planners. Council will review it at the next meeting.
- Was told they lost assessment of \$365,705 to Milton in the recent annexation of land.
- Resolved to ask the County Health Unit to continue plumbing inspection in the township after receiving word from the County Board of Health inspections would be discontinued as of Sept. 1, 1969.
- Filed a request for memberships in the Ontario Municipal Association.
- Authorized payment of \$14 to Ed Robinson, Hornby and \$7 to Mike Tost of Georgetown for foxes destroyed.
- Supported the Health Unit which withheld permission to build a home at Lot 5, Con. 4 on the Mel Stark farm. The township can not issue a building permit without the endorsement of the Health Unit.
- Passed road accounts of \$15,739.35.

WATCH OUT! SCHOOLS' OUT for the mid term holiday, March 17 to 21, and young cyclists will be out in full force. Last year, in Ontario, 40 children under 15 years old, were killed while riding bicycles (compared with 17 the year before) and another 1,470 were injured in accidents serious enough to be reported to the police. Motorists are advised to keep a sharp lookout for youngsters zooming out of driveways and for inexperienced cyclists wobbling shakily along. Parents are advised to make sure their youngsters know and obey the traffic rules for safe cycling and to check the mechanical fitness of the bikes their children ride.

Report shows 2,463 telephones in Acton

Bell Canada's annual report showed 200 telephones were added in Acton during 1968, bringing the total number of telephones in service to 2,463. There were 299,000 new phones added to the network last year. Total number of telephones served by Bell reached 5.4 million during the year. Bell's construction expenditures in Acton during 1968 were listed at \$89,156. Total company expenditures were \$313 million. Taxes amounting to \$10,766 in Acton last year were part of the company's \$141,115,000 tax bill to the three levels of government. Bell's total payroll in the Guelph region amounted to \$1,073,850, according to the report. The report predicted Canada's population would reach 25 million by 1980 and some 2.5 million new jobs will have to be created. Bell expects the number of telephones it serves will increase by 70 per cent in the next decade. The company asked for a general rate increase in 1968. The company's new rate schedule, if approved, will increase revenues by 10 per cent. Several municipalities are opposing the rate increase.

50,000 copies tabloid paper go to parents

A tabloid-type newspaper will be prepared for distribution to parents four to six times a year, the County Board of Education agreed Thursday in adopting a report from its committee on communication. Committee chairman G. W. Johnston told the Board the committee anticipated 50,000 copies being distributed through the schools at an annual cost not to exceed \$5,000. Trustee Liberty Pease suggested an editorial board should be set up that would encourage participation by students as well as staff. Trustee J. H. Price observed there seemed to be a reluctance on the part of parents to phone trustees on complaints and problems. "We should assure parents we are willing to hear from them," he said, as he recalled having received no more than five or six calls during his terms on school boards.

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
