Bad roads to pioneer cemeteries wide range on Eramosa agenda

A budget of \$1,500 was approved for the new committee of adjustment at the last meeting of Eramosa council. Councilors estimated much of this would be returned through application fees to be collected.

Reeve Cameron Lish looked through a sheaf of letters, information and invitations and observed to his colleagues that sitting back in isolation would be the worst kind of policy in these changing times.

A letter from the Guelph and suburban planning board requested attention to the board's budget of \$2,500 of which \$500 was Eramosa's share. The motion carried.

Grants of \$25. to Guelph branch of the Canadian Red Cross, and \$30 to Wellington County Crop and Soil Improvement Association, were authorized.

Road superintendent Bob Hamilton will attend the four-day Anderson good roads school at the University of Guelph, where he will study basic surveying at a cost of \$50 and expenses.

A committee was set up to study location and condition of pioneer cemeteries in the township and report back to council.

Sections of the building by-law were replaced by new rulings which conform to the National Building Code in its entirety.

Wellington County board of education requested that a system of reporting road conditions during bad weather be set up. It was agreed the road superintendent should report to county officials at 7 a.m. daily regarding outgoing bus trips.

With limited funds available, council decided to view conditions while on roads

inspection and undertake greatest needs first. A ratepayer who had spent a substantial sum of money obtaining legal advice in connection with a drainage project, asked financial redress after the project was abandoned. Council pointed out the township was likewise out of pocket following a no-further action resolution. His request was turned down.

The problem of severance fees where new streets are required was discussed but no action taken.

Turner were appointed members of Eramosa planning board for the next three years.

Payment of roads accounts of \$22,981.13, and general accounts of \$1,972.30, making a total of \$24,953.43, was authorized. Next regular council meeting will be April 7.
