



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
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Superintendent Bruce Lindley presented the multi page budget at a recent meeting of the Halton County Board of Education reviewing in detail the

expenditures. Superintendent Bruce Lindley presented the multi-page budget reviewing in detail the

expenditures. He noted the average cost of education per pupil in the total system was \$724.16 with \$506.23 of this accounted for in instruction and \$18.74 in educational services.

Other points noted in the budget presentations included:

Rental of the Central Administration Building in Oakville is at \$2.25 per square foot or \$52,525 annually.

• 30 television sets are to be purchased for elementary

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schools and 25 for secondary

 An expenditure of \$25,550 is projected for computer time tabling in five secondary schools.

· Maintenance of approximately 2,000,000 square feet of elementary school buildings and one and a half million square feet of secondary

schools is required. In the county elementary schools 60 are heated by oil, 10 by gas, one by electricity and two by coal. The secondary schools are 10 on oil and two on

• For elementary school pupils the board has 141 transportation routes covering 4,200 miles daily, moving 5,270 pupils or 17 per cent of the school population. At the secondary school level there are 95 routes covering 3,000 miles, moving 3,379 pupils or 40 per cent of the secondary

enrolment. " In September the pupil-teacher ratio will be maintained at 25-1 for elementary schools and 18.5-1 for secondary schools. The ratio includes, non-teaching principals and does not reflect classes of 25
