Complete Fairy Lake dredging early in 1969 C.V.C.A. told

The dredging project at Fairy Lake in Acton, a pilot project for the province, will be completed early in 1969, Credit Valley Conservation Authority was told at the annual meeting

Dredging has already removed approximately 275,000 cubic vards of silt from the lake bottom since the project began in 1967. If the plan is economically, feasible, many more small reservoirs may be dredged for water storage purposes.

Resources manager S. B. White outlined progress on the other projects the Authority has underway for the meeting:

First phase of a channel. improvement project to provide flood protection to the village of Glen Williams was completed in 1968 by the Authority. The work included the relocation of 1,000 feet of river channel to eliminate a sharp bend in the river which was the cause of serious ice lamming and flooding in past springs ..

Construction work on the Orangeville dams and reservoir was substantially completed by the end of 1968. There is some minor clean-up work to be finished after frost leaves the ground this spring. When full, the reservoir will cover 460 acres and hold 164 million gallons of water. An overall plan will be made of the area after water height and amount to be released has been established.

An erosion-control project was completed this year in the village of Melville in Caledon Township. Rock-filled gabion baskets will protect the river bank and the cost was shared by the Township and the adjoining land owners

Conservation Authority. Mississauga. Tender documents Food. and working drawings are now
