Decide to enter Juve boxla club

The 68-69 Stanley Cup Playoffs are only a week old, and already three of the eight teams that set out in quest of Lord Stanley's silverware have succumbed to the pressures of the task and fallen by the wayside.

In fact, two of the aforementioned teams, the Toronto Maple Leafs and the Philadelphia Flyers were so badly outclassed by their opponents, the Boston Bruins and St. Louis Blues, respectively, that they could have been mistaken for two teams out of the "Speyside and District Rural League"! The Leafs were outscored by the "narrow" margin of 24-5 in their four game series with the Bruins and the Flyers scored only three times in their series, while the Blues were popping 17 pucks into the Philadelphia cage.

The third, the New York Rangers managed to put forth a reasonably good effort, but were not able to stop the pin-point passing plays of the high-flying Habs from Montreal, and also bit the dust in four games.

The Leaf-Bruin series created the most commotion and street corner discussions in this neck of the woods. The Bruins, of course dominated the series, and it seemed that every time Foster Hewitt appeared at the end of a game to select the three stars, his choices were limited, and justly so, to members of the Bruins.

While watching the fiasco that occurred in the first game, and the minor tussles of the other three games, I jotted down a list of players and officials whose words and actions deserve special mention and perhaps some form of award, whether it be for something they added to the series or for something they said or did that created excitement.

FOR BRAVERY ABOVE AND BEYOND THE CALL OF DUTY: Linesman George Ashley, who after being flattened by the solid right hand of Leaf's Forbes Kennedy bounced back up almost as quickly as he went down, in a vain attempt to prevent further outbreaks of fistcuffs!

FOR THE MOST INACCURATE PREDICTION: Chicago Black Hawk defenseman Pat Stapleton, in an interview with Ward Cornell between periods of the first game, which the Bruins led 6-0. "Well Ward, I'm going to go out on a limb and say that the Leafs will come back and win this series." ... That must have been a rotten limb, Pat!

FOR THE UNDERSTATEMENT OF THE SERIES: Television commentator Brian MacFarlane, "midst all the fist-swinging, wrestling, head-butting and whatever other nasty little events took place during the first game, perhaps for the benefit of late tuners-in, unfamiliar with the game. "This is not hockey!"

BEST ALL-ROUND ATHLETE: Leaf's Mike Pelyk, who demonstrated his apparent skill in the game of golf by promptly golfing the puck away every time he got it!

FOR SHOWING UNUSUAL KINDNESS TOWARDS THE OPPOSITION IN THE CAUSE OF GOOD SPORTSMANSHIP: Leaf's George Armstrong, who after making a fine check, set up Bruins first goal, Sunday night, with a perfect pass to Ed Westfall!

CONSOLATION PRIZE FOR HARD LUCK GUY OF THE SERIES: Murray Oliver of the Leafs, who obviously got out of "Beantown" too early. After over 10 years of last place finishes with the Bruins, he finally got a taste of Stanley Cup Playoff action, only to see his team go out in four straight at the hands of his former teammates! Then if that wasn't enough he was nearly knocked cold, when he ran into Derek Sanderson's high stick in the third period of Sunday night's game.

MOST SURPRISING INDIVIDUAL PLAY OF THE SERIES: The cute behind the back pass Eddie Shack gave Sanderson to set up Bruins' final goal on Sunday night. Eddie, who has been known more for his brawn than his brain in the past, surprised everyone watching by passing the puck, when he was in position to score himself.

And finally, if there are still enough good solid limbs left, one last prediction from this reporter.

MOST EXPECTED RESULT OF THE SERIES: A wholesale shakeup in personnel on the part of the Leaf management. Stafford Smythe started it all off just two minutes after the series was over, by firing coach and general manager Punch Imlach, and you can bet your bottom dollar that his successors Jim Gregory and John McClellan will both be busy during the summer talking trades with the rest of the teams in the league.
