Opening lead - King of diamonds. North South were using the Deury convention. Since many duplicate players open light in third and fourth position, Deury is used to check if opener was light or not.

Thus North's two club bids check partner if he has shaded his opening bid. With only 12 points, South admits that he is not too strong with his two diamond bid. The bidding then settles at a reasonable two spade contract.
