

**Third generation tanner
Frank Heller dies suddenly**

A manufacturer of specialty leathers, Frank Heller died unexpectedly at his home, 67 Lake Ave., Acton, on March 29. He was the third generation tanner in his family.

Funeral service was held at the Rumley-Shoemaker funeral home on Tuesday afternoon, April 1, and interment followed in Fairview cemetery. Rev. H. Dawson conducted the services. Pallbearers were his brother-in-law John Allen, cousin Bruno Miller, George Mason, John Vigneuve, Walter Sedelbauer and Howard Dwyer.

Mr. Heller is survived by his wife, the former Greta Muller, son Ronald; daughter Mrs. Fred Dawkins (Karin); granddaughter Kristine Dawkins and sister Mrs. John Allen (Mary) Acton. He was predeceased by his brother Charles.

He was born in Czechoslovakia in 1909, son of Rudolf and Helene Heller, and after high school attended the Academy in Prague. After two years in the Czech army he joined his father in the tanning business.

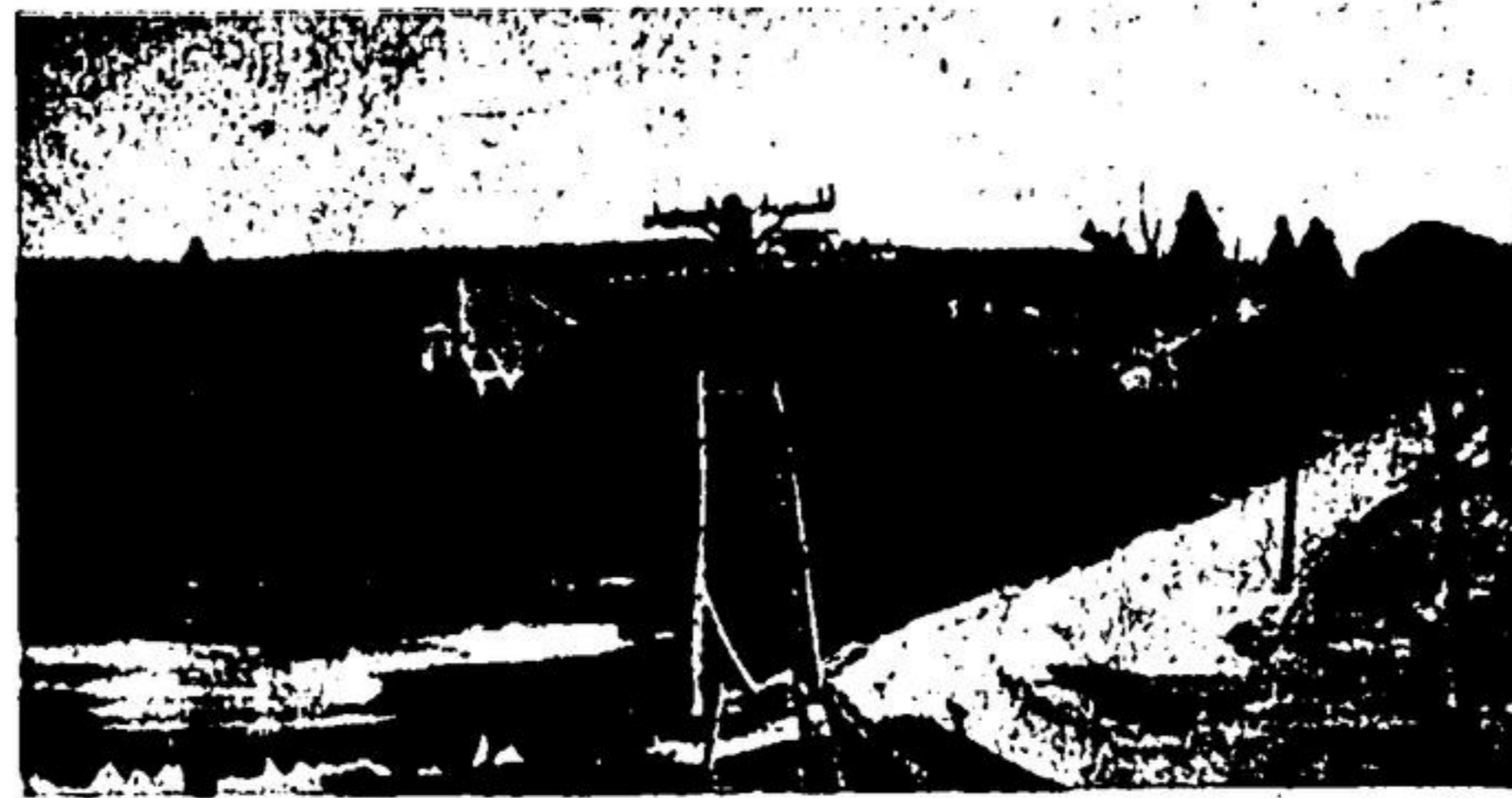
Funeral service was held at the Rehill Funeral Home, Omamee, March 27 with Rev. John Urquhart officiating. Interment was in Emily cemetery.

**No clergy shortage
