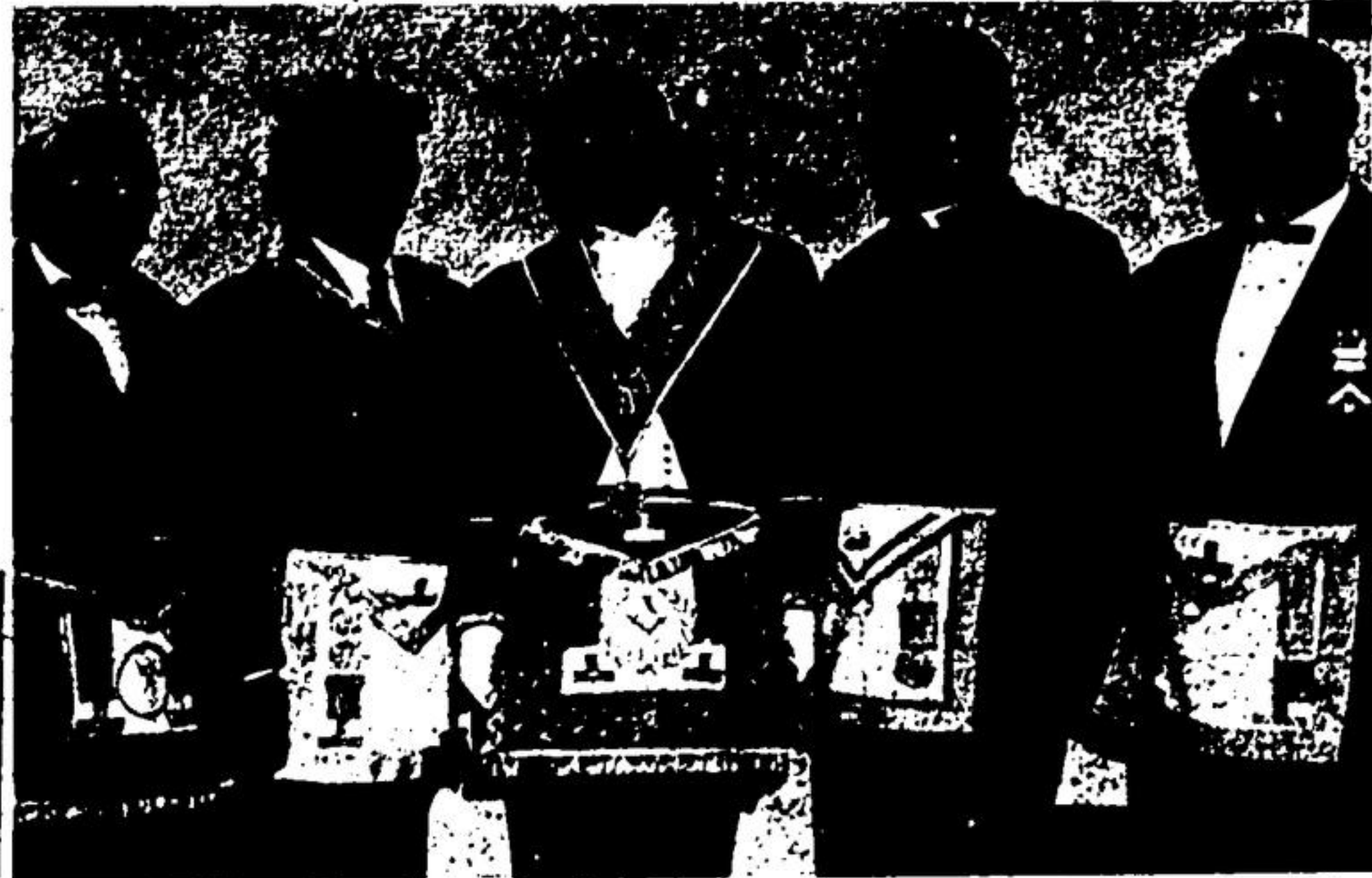


\$50 damage Thursday

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Two tier regional hydro control favored

The Acton Hydro Commission took tangible steps towards a two-tier regional system at their regular sitting last Thursday night.

Following a meeting of the Halton-Peel Hydro Study Commission in Oakville on April

8, Acton and Georgetown could be linked in what is known as District 4.

According to Acton's representative Ted Tyler Sr. Acton, Georgetown and possibly some of Esquimes need to come up with a unanimous decision to work co-operatively if the north is to hold any weight over the larger municipalities in the south. He feels the top part of Nassagaweya might also be included in this District 4 to form an effective block. "It certainly wouldn't be any hardship for us," he said.

On this basis, the Commission passed a motion supporting the recommendations of the Halton-Peel Hydro Study Commission for a two-tier system and favouring District 4 as an acceptable system to provide service to the community rather than be serviced from Orangeville or Burlington.

In other business, the Commission agreed to pay a delayed billing adjustment of \$5,091.91 to Ontario Municipal Hydro Association. However, a letter of protest is to be sent to the O.M.H.A. Chairman for interest charged to the commission since Jan. 1 since they were not notified of the bill

until April 8. The interest amounted to \$54.1.

Residents will now pay \$5 for service calls in town and \$ for turn on after non-payment of hydro bills.

High school teachers given \$400 increase

Halton's secondary school teachers have settled with the Halton County Board of Education for salaries ranging from \$6,800 to \$14,400. The settlement was announced at the County Board of Education meeting Thursday by Trustee Bruce Edwards who headed the board's negotiating committee.

Elementary school teachers had settled some weeks earlier. The secondary teachers cast ballots in the county's 12 secondary schools to accept the board offer.

The salary range is from \$6,800 for a beginning teacher with a three year university degree, to the maximum of \$14,400 for experience; well-qualified staff members. The settlement means an increase of generally \$400 in all pay levels in addition to the \$300 annual increment written in to the contract.

A total of 10 department heads, mostly in Oakville, will be relieved of their titles in September, because of an adjustment in the qualifications required for the positions.

Salary levels under the contract will be from \$6,800 to \$11,200 in level one; \$7,100 to \$11,900 in level two; \$7,900 to \$13,500 in level three, and \$8,400 to \$14,400 in level four.
